

Instructions on Sending Gifts To Prisoners Given

Father W. L. Blaker, prisoner of war specialist, has stated that boxes to send articles to the prisoners of war may be acquired from him at 228 East Cass.

He states that the boxes are to be had by next of kin but anyone may contribute to the parcel. By the time the first parcel is received, most prisoners have already had the capture parcel, contributed by the American Red Cross, containing emergency supplies, as well as several standard food parcels. Father Blaker continues to state that the first next of kin parcel should supply as many necessary articles as possible, but it should supplement rather than duplicate items contained in the packages already received by the prisoner.

Parcels must not weigh over 11 pounds after they are wrapped. Some of the articles that may be sent are as follows: tobacco pouches, pipes, non-metallic combs, safety razors, nail clippers, safety pins, pajamas, gloves, overshoes, mending kits, knife, fork and spoon, drawing materials, can opener or other cooking utensils, baking powder, dried puddings, dried vegetables, cereals, powdered coffee, seasoning material except pepper, dried fruits, dried soups, hard candy, nuts and crackers.

Several articles which should be repeated are: Toilet kit with nonbreakable shaving mirror, bath soap, tooth powder, tooth brushes, toilet paper, shaving brushes, shaving soap cakes and powder, safety razor blades, socks, underwear, handkerchiefs, vitamins, soap flakes and playing cards.

Games that require thought and offer an opportunity for the prisoner to develop his creative ability, Father Blaker said, are excellent. The choice of games will depend a great deal upon whether the prisoner of war is wounded or able-bodied and upon his personal likes and dislikes. Excellent games to send are: Dices, chess, cribbage, puzzles, and dominoes. Chinese checkers and poker chips.

Father Blaker also stated that lists of articles should be kept by next of kin so that unnecessary items would not be repeated.

Precipitation was only 1.44 inches, spread over six scattered days, 1.17 inches below the normal mark, leaving a deficiency of 1.89 inches since Sept. 1, 1944, the beginning of the wet season.

Sutherland Vote on School Bond Issue Set for Nov. 14

SUTHERLIN—A special school district election will be held in Sutherland at the city hall from 2 to 7 p. m. Tuesday, Nov. 14, to pass upon a proposal to issue bonds in the sum of \$23,000 to be used in connection with federal funds allocated to aid in construction of needed elementary school facilities.

A federal grant of \$48,000 has been approved, demanding local cooperation in the sum of \$18,000.

If the bonds are voted, the local and federal money is proposed to be used in construction of an elementary school unit providing four class rooms and other essential facilities.

Application for additional federal grants is planned, and the \$5,000 remaining from the bond issue will be used as the sponsor's portion in the event the second grant is obtained. The extra \$5,000 will not be used, it is reported by the school board, except for additional class rooms.

Rapid expansion of population in the Sutherland district has resulted in overcrowding of existing school facilities. Classes in the elementary grades include from 23 to 43 pupils. Six teachers are now employed, and it is projected to add three members to the faculty and thereby reduce the number of pupils under the supervision of the individual instructors.

As the existing school building provides only four class rooms, the school board is arranging use of two rooms from the Christian church and quarters at the federal housing project temporarily.

Myrtle Creek Football 6 Defeats Glendale, 20 to 0

MYRTLE CREEK—Obviously irked by their recent defeat at Elkton, the Myrtle Creek Vikings journeyed to Glendale Friday and won a 20 to 0 victory from the Pirates in a six-man football game. Myrtle Creek scored early in the game with a long pass to Smith, followed by running plays. Neither team scored in the second period, and the half found the Vikings in front 6 to 0.

Glendale resorted to an aerial attack in the second half, but were unable to break through the Myrtle Creek defense. The Vikings pushed over two touchdowns by mixing runnings plays and passes.

A return game will be played at Myrtle Creek Nov. 10.

LaMotta gave Kochan a severe trouncing before the referee stopped the bout at 2:40 of the ninth round.

Health Officer Of Douglas Writes of War Activities

The extent of U. S. military activities in New Guinea "staggeres the imagination," according to A. N. Johnson, now on leave from his position as Douglas county public health officer, while serving as a lieutenant commander in the navy medical corps.

At his present station in New Guinea, Commander Johnson reports, American power machinery, coupled with native labor, has cleared a beach strip 35 miles long and a half-mile deep out of dense jungle and there has been installed "a civilized community of American boys and a few American girls."

Annual rainfall at this base, he reports, is from 250 to 300 inches. But despite the rain, open air motion picture shows are crowded every night.

Commander Johnson tells, in his letter to the News-Review, of gorgeously colored butterflies ranging in size from a quarter-inch to wingspreads of as much as 20 inches. Huge, some with a wingspread of more than three feet, are as numerous as sparrows in the U. S. he reports.

Pension, Sales Tax Bills Again Await Oregon's Verdicts

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 3. (AP)—Oregon's general election ballot wouldn't look natural unless it contained measures relating to old age pensions and a sales tax. Next Tuesday's ballot contains both.

The most controversial measure on the ballot is the "little Townsend" old age pension bill, which would amend the constitution by levying a 3 to 5 per cent gross income tax to pay old age pensions of at least \$60 a month. But the 3 per cent sales tax bill is a close second.

A voter knows by now that the Townsend bill will do one of two things. Its proponents claim it would bring prosperity by compelling the beneficiaries to spend all the money they receive, while the opponents contend the tax would cause utter ruin, driving many industries out of the state and closing up most of the rest.

The tax would affect the gross income of every person and every business, and there are no exceptions.

The bill would prevent the state from ever enacting a sales tax, but opponents claim the gross income tax really is a sales tax in itself. Legal experts are wonder-

Sherman Forrest Struck By Auto

Sherman Forrest, 33, 1002 N. Stephens St., Roseburg, suffered severe bruises and cuts about 9:30 p. m. Thursday when he was struck by an automobile reportedly driven by Charles Curtis Fox, Drinn. The accident occurred on Jackson street, near the Kohlhaugen building, only a half-block from the point where W. S. Chapman, Spanish American war veteran, was injured in a similar accident Thursday afternoon.

Forrest stepped out from between parked automobiles directed in the path of the car driven by Fox, Chief of Police Erwin Short reported.

He was taken to Mercy hospital, where his physician found "open facial and head cuts, and numerous bruises. However, no bones were broken."

Chapman, who was hurt shortly after 1 p. m. Thursday when struck by an automobile driven by Mrs. Frankie Grubbe, Oakland, at the corner of Jackson and Oak streets, was reported today to have suffered a broken shoulder. He is being treated at Mercy hospital.

Conviction of 2 for Oregon Murder Upheld

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 3. (AP)—The state supreme court today unanimously upheld the first degree murder convictions of Henry W. Morton and Walter L. Wilson, sentenced to die in the prison gas chamber for the murder of R. S. Porter.

The men held up a restaurant near Oregon City, and shot and killed Porter, who was eating at a counter.

Taken, but Not for Ride, CHICAGO, Nov. 4. (AP)—L. G. Mosley stepped into what he believed was a taxicab to be driven home.

But it wasn't a cab and the occupant of the driver's seat of the private parked automobile greeted Mosley by robbing him of \$30, a watch and his topcoat, and electing him, he told Des Moines street police.

Hughson Building Program Adopted, Junior High School

The O. G. Hughson building program, for youthful students of industrial arts, has been adopted at Roseburg junior high school, it is reported by Paul S. Elliott, city superintendent of schools. Mr. Hughson recently visited the Roseburg schools at the invitation of Mr. Elliott and Harry E. Wilson, trades and industry coordinator and since his visit has furnished the school with blueprints together with some rough materials which include yellow pine, cedar and fir lumber.

Originally designed as a curb to juvenile delinquency, Mr. Hughson's program, now operated under the name of the Oregon building congress, has been incorporated into the industrial arts department of many schools of the state. It was the conception of Mr. Hughson, an experienced carpenter and builder, that boys interested in building projects and given training in the use of tools would have an interest which would curb tendencies toward delinquency. He personally introduced and financed the program during the 1933 depression and it was very successful in the purpose for which it was created.

The idea was expanded under Mr. Hughson's supervision and has now been introduced into many schools. It provides projects whereby boys working as teams construct model houses, barns, and other buildings according to blueprint and in the exact pattern by which full-sized buildings would be erected. Instruction is given in the use of hand operated and power tools.

Peter S. Griest, instructor in the junior high school manual arts department, now is supervising construction of a model building on a Hughson plan, and is assigning other projects.

"In my opinion, this is one of the finest projects in the high school manual training program under the state course of study and every boy who gets in on one of these projects is indeed fortunate," Superintendent Elliott said.

Not Picker Shortage Faced by Lane Growers

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 3. (AP)—"Vacuum cleaner" harvesters are helpful, but they still haven't solved the help problem for nut growers in this area, they said today.

Recent rains and high winds have caused heavy falling, and some estimates were that only 50 per cent of the walnut and filbert crops have been harvested. Many pickers are needed.

Fugitive Convict From Walla Walla Captured

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 3. (AP)—Leigh Haskell Fowler, 45, of Stanwood, Wash., described by Police Lieut. Daniel McKlem as an escaped convict from Walla Walla (Wash.) prison, was captured here today by a squad of 10 police officers.

Lieut. McKlem charged him on

three counts of suspicion of robbery, and said he would be charged with kidnapping two San Francisco patrolmen in Golden Gate park several weeks ago. Their guns were taken from them.

Floyd Richardson, 46, under indictment here for robbery, was described by Lieut. McKlem as a partner of Fowler in a series of holdups. Richardson was arrested in Los Angeles.

Co-Ops Name M'Conrack To Farm Credit Board

SPOKANE, Nov. 3. (AP)—Co-operators of the Pacific northwest have elected E. A. McConrack of Eugene, Ore., to the board of directors of the Farm Credit administration of Spokane, general agent R. E. Brown announced today.

He succeeds W. H. Ragsdale of The Dalles, Ore., who was not a candidate for reelection for the three-year term starting Jan. 1, 1945.

McConrack, who operates his

own farm, has been general manager of the Eugene Fruit Growers association since 1935 and director since 1932 of the Pacific Wool growers, of which he also has been president. He is a member of the state board of agriculture and a director of the Oregon State Cooperative council.
