Chinese Educator Dated For Speech in Roseburg

Top Members of Congress Await Verdict at Polls

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7—(AP)—Some of the best-known figures in public life await the verdict today as the nation's voters pick party lineups for the 79th congress.

Whether the republicans can take six house and 12 senate seats from democratic holders to win control of the country's legislative machinery depends in large measure on the success of veteran campaigners.

The new congress will work with war and postwar problems of unprecedented magnitude. That is particularly true of the senate, where a two-thirds majority is required for ratification of peace and other upcoming treaties.

Thirty-five senate seats, three for short terms, are at stake. In the 435-man house, 432 races are under way, Maine having reelected its three republicans in Sept.

Senator Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky, majority leader of the senate, is opposed by republican James Park. Their race tops the list of democratic incumbents with fighting republican opposition.

"Isolationists" Face Verdict
Eight republicans dubbed "isolationists" by Senator Harry S. Truman, the democratic vice presidential nominee, are up for reelection. These men are Senators Taft of Ohio; Tobe, New Hampshire; Nye, North Dakota; Danaher, Connecticut; Davis, Pennsylvania; Millikin, Colorado; Reed, Kansas; and Wiley, Wisconsin.

The republicans in advance claimed victory in their efforts to unseat Democratic Senator Guy M. Gillette of Iowa, opposed by Republican Gov. Bourke B. Hickenlooper, Senator Scott W. Lucas, Illinois Democrat, opposed by Richard J. Lyons of Libertyville, and in senate races in Missouri and Idaho and other states where democrats hold seats.

Dewey's Aide in Race
Democratic Senator Robert F. Wagner of New York, 67-year-old author of the labor relations act, faces Thomas J. Curran, 45-year-old republican secretary of state of New York, an associate of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey.

On the west coast, democratic Senator Sheridan Downey has the spirited competition of republican Lieutenant-Governor Frederick F. Houser.

The Missouri contest brought Attorney General Roy McKittick victor in the democratic primary over Senator Bennett Clark, up against Republican Governor Forest C. Donnell.

Both Sides Claim Gains
With the republicans talking of gaining as many as 60 additional house seats from the democrats, and the latter forecasting a minimum gain of their own of 25 in that body, numerical calculations overshadowed personalities in all but a score of the races for house seats. Democrats now hold 214, the republicans 212.

Attracting outside attention are the races of:
Rep. Stephen A. Day, Illinois republican, prewar opponent of administration foreign policies, against Mrs. Emily Taft Douglas, democratic wife of Capt. Paul Douglas of the marines.
Rep. Clare Boothe Luce, republican, and Margaret E. Connors of Bridgeport, democrat, in the Fourth Connecticut district.

Mrs. Helen Gahagan Douglas, democrat, actress wife of Melvyn Douglas, and William D. Campbell, republican, Los Angeles business man.

Prices Tumble as Reds Fete Revolt Anniversary

MOSCOW, Nov. 7—(AP)—Vodka prices went down 25 per cent today as Russia celebrated the 27th anniversary of her revolution. Cigaret and tobacco prices tumbled also.

The gilded domes of the Kremlin were polished for the occasion. Hardly a Muscovite house failed to fly a red banner.

State stores issued special candy and cookie rations to children from seven months to 12 years of age.

Bands paraded through the streets. Marching groups swung from time to time, but the general idea was group singing and the hit tunes were "Moscow, My Moscow" and "Beloved City."

Jewish Gunmen Slay British Envoy at Cairo
CAIRO, Nov. 7—(AP)—Jewish terrorists assassinated Lord Moyne, 64, British resident minister in the Middle East, yesterday, officials said today.

(Prime Minister Churchill said in London that he had no official information giving a clue as to the motives for the assassination, or fixing its authorship. He added Lord Moyne had devoted himself this year to a solution of the Zionist problem, and that the Jews in Palestine "had rarely lost a better or more well informed friend.")

Lord Moyne was shot down as he alighted from a car at his residence here. His chauffeur was killed instantly.

One of the gunmen was shot by an Egyptian constable and the other was captured nearby.

Police said the prisoners, speaking in Hebrew, told them: "We are saying nothing. We are waiting for court."

New Spud Prices Easy On Consumer's Purse

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7—(AP)—Early white (Irish) potatoes will cost the consumer about the same as last year under maximum shipping point prices it was announced today.

The ceilings apply from the beginning of the season through June 30, 1945, maximums announced by the OPA were based on the average return to the grower as last year's ceilings. OPA said they were 17 cents a hundredweight higher than required by law, but had been recommended by the War Food administration as necessary to maintain the production of potatoes at a level sufficient to meet estimated needs.

Clear Field for Western Industry to Be Sought

PORTLAND, Nov. 7—(AP)—Two Portland men will seek unhampered development of western industry at a hearing before the senate special committee to investigate industrial centralization in San Francisco Nov. 16-18.

E. V. Burns, vice-president of the Portland chamber of commerce, and Clarence Seage, the chamber's consulting engineer, will attend the hearing.

Sen. Pat McCarran of Nevada heads the special committee, which believes the west can absorb 10,000,000 more people.

Strathmore, Father of Queen of Britain, Dies

LONDON, Nov. 7—(AP)—The Earl of Strathmore, 89, father of Queen Elizabeth of Great Britain, died today at Glamis castle, his home at Forfarshire, Scotland.

His death brought the second bereavement to the British royal family in less than a fortnight. The court was due to go out of mourning Thursday for the death of Princess Beatrix, great-aunt of King George VI and the last surviving child of Queen Victoria.

Son of Ex-OSC President Killed in Air Crash

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 7—(AP)—Frank L. Ballard, former Oregon State College president, disclosed today that his only son, Richard, was one of the victims of yesterday's naval air crash at Jacksonville, Fla.

Lt. (jg) Richard Ballard, 21, joined the naval air force two years ago and was awaiting an assignment to pilot the navy's largest transports from this country to Britain in the naval transport command.

Evangelistic Services Set at Salvation Army

Brigadier and Mrs. F. Howell, Portland, of the Salvation Army are scheduled to visit with the Roseburg corps for a week, it was announced today by the Roseburg officers. Brigadier Howell will conduct special evangelistic services starting Saturday, Nov. 11, and continuing through Nov. 16. Meetings will be held each evening at the Salvation Army hall starting at 8 o'clock. The public is invited.

Erskine, State Utility Board Attorney, Dies

PORTLAND, Nov. 7—(AP)—Charles W. Erskine, general counsel for the Oregon Public Utilities commission, died at Veterans hospital today after several months' illness.

Erskine, 57, served as Crook county deputy district attorney, deputy U. S. district attorney, and chief federal prosecutor in this district before resigning to enter private practice in 1933. He was a graduate of the University of Oregon and Willamette University law school.

The widow, Helen, his mother, and a son and daughter survive him.
