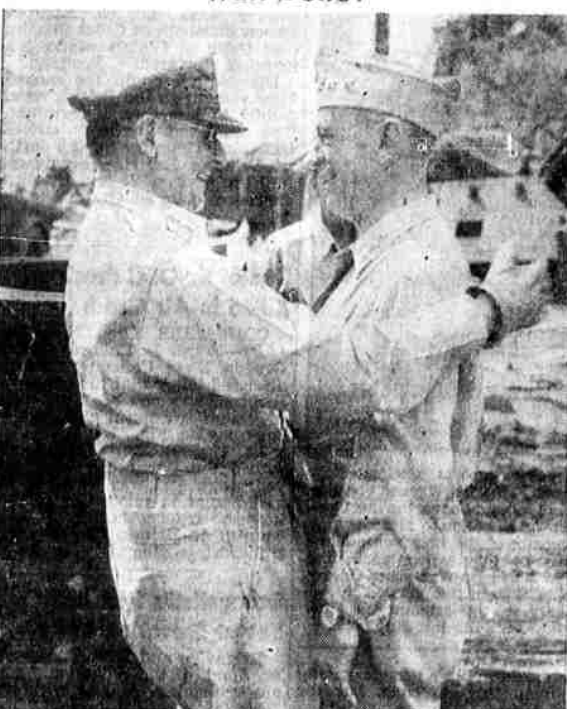
FRIENDLY CIRCLE CLUB TO MEET

Messages May be Sent Prisoners Through Red Cross

During November any person with a friend or relative held as a prisoner of war or United States civilian interned in the Philippines may send a message through local Red Cross chapters on special Red Cross forms.

These messages, which may be written on both sides of the form, will be subject only to censorship requirements of army overseas mail. Guaranteed delivery cannot be made by the Red Cross but every effort will be made to enable prisoners and internees to establish contact with families as soon as possible after the liberation of the Philippines.

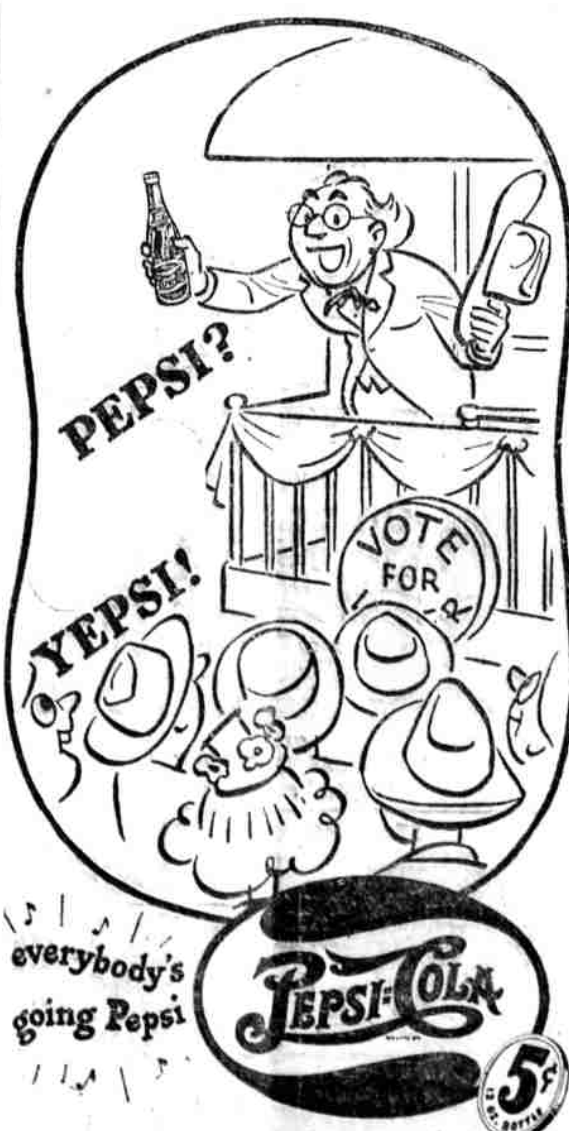
