

All Oregon Offices Won by Republicans

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won statehood in 1859 had the state failed to cast its electoral vote for the winner. But the Dewey lead looked like the state would fail to follow the national trend for the fourth time.

The president had a 4,300-vote lead in Multnomah county, but this wasn't big enough to over-

come Dewey's 7,600-vote lead in the other 35 counties, so Dewey had a 3,300-vote margin for the whole state. The state had voted for Roosevelt for his first three terms.

Congressmen Win Easily

Cordon, running for reelection to the four-year unexpired term of the late Sen. Charles L. McNary, had no trouble disposing of Willis Mahoney, Klamath Falls democrat, who conceded Cordon's election only two hours after the polls closed.

Morse, who defeated Sen. Rufus

C. Holman in the primary, won even more easily from Edgar W. Smith, Portland democrat, who was only five minutes behind Mahoney in conceding.

Rep. James W. Mott, Salem, won more than 2 to 1 over O. Henry Olsen, St. Helens democrat; Rep. Lowell Stockman, Pendleton, had the same margin over C. J. Shorb, La Grande democrat; Rep. Homer D. Angell, Portland, held a 3 to 2 lead over Lester Sheeley, Portland democrat; and Rep. Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg, had twice as many votes as his opponent, Floyd K. Dover, Grants Pass democrat.

Mott is the dean of the congressional delegation, having served since 1932, while Angell is finishing his third term. Ellsworth and Stockman are ending their first terms.

Treasurer Scott had almost a 2 to 1 lead over William Lambert, Portland. Attorney General Neuner stayed off the bid of Bruce Spaulding, Salem democrat. Neuner leading by 10,000. It was the second try for the job by Spaulding, who almost defeated Van Winkle four years ago.

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264 were needed to win.

The New York governor, who fought Mr. Roosevelt strenuously in the nation's first wartime election of a president in 80 years, said:

"I am confident that all Americans will join me in the hope that divine providence will guide and protect the president of the United States."

He smiled in sportsmanlike acceptance of the loss of the highest honor of the land.

Bricker Pledges Aid

With Mr. Roosevelt, of course, went Vice Presidential Nominee Harry S. Truman, who ten years ago an obscure county judge in Missouri.

Senator Truman called Dewey's statement "grand," saying at Kansas City that "it is our duty now to uphold his good wishes and win the war and win the peace."

Governor John W. Bricker of Ohio, who campaigned harder than any other man in his capacity as No. 2 on the republican ticket, said at Columbus that he joined in Dewey's sentiment.

"I congratulate the winners and shall do all I can to aid in the war effort and making our country stronger and better," said Bricker.

The Germans said also that the Russians were preparing a new large scale attack in southwest Poland from the west side of the Vistula. Such a drive ultimately would threaten penetration of German Silesia.

Polish troops with the British Eighth army in Italy captured Monte Casale, south of Forli, after beating off heavy counterattacks, and threatened to outflank Forli, where the British have been stalled on the outskirts.

Italy-based U. S. Flying Fortresses and Liberators heavily attacked troop concentrations and targets in Yugoslavia, northern Italy and Austria last night. American and British fighter bombers based on the continent carried out several attacks on enemy western front positions. After a rest yesterday, American bombers headed toward Germany again today.

SEATTLE, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Republican Gov. Arthur B. Langlie, a 3-to-1 favorite for re-election in pre-Tuesdays wagery, today trailed Democratic Sen. Mon C. Wallgren in unofficial returns from yesterday's heavy balloting in which President Roosevelt won Washington's eight electoral votes. Rep. Warren G. Magnuson (D.) was increasing his lead over Lt. Col. Harry Cain for Sen. Homer T. Bone's seat.

Democrats were leading for all state elective offices.

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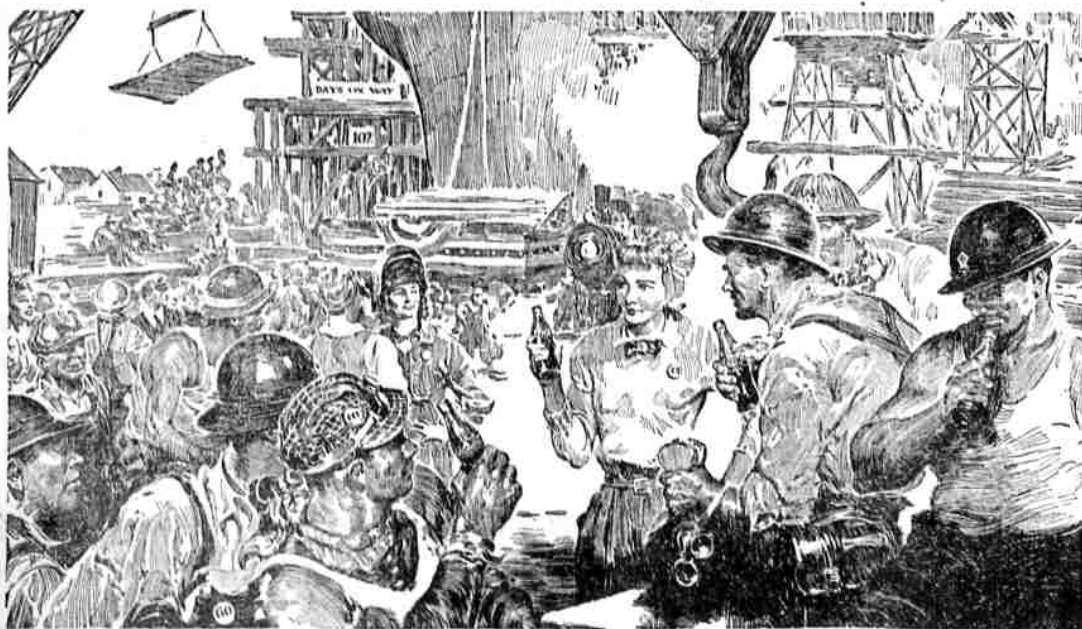

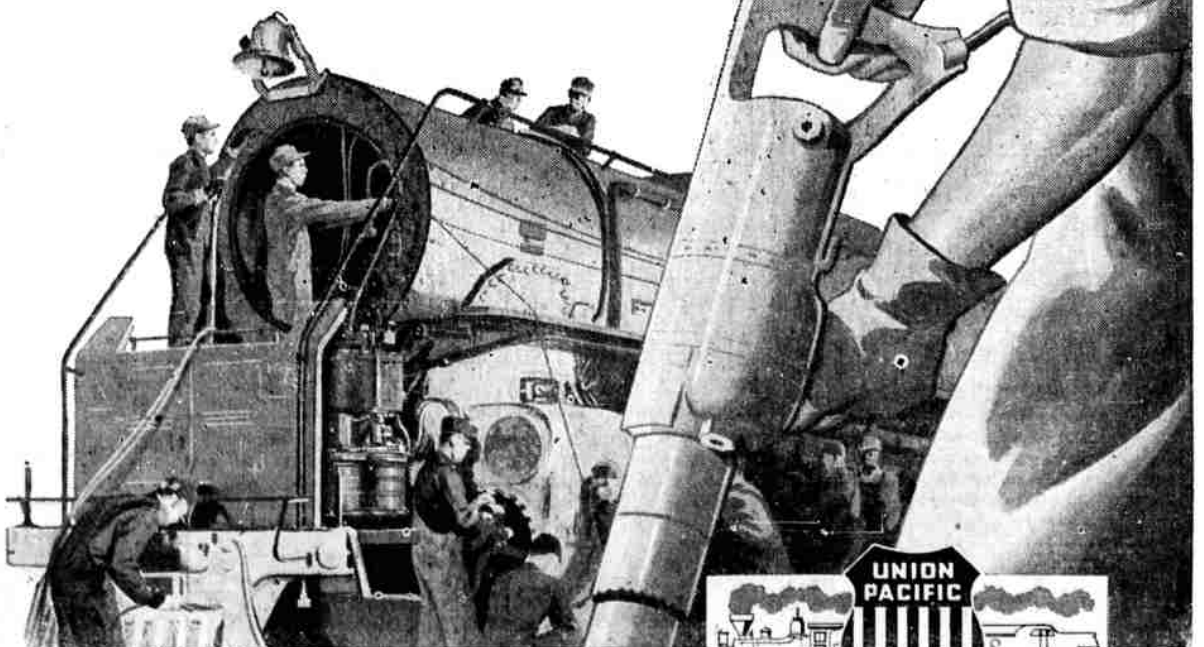
