Achievements of
4-H Are Cited in
National Week

The week of November 4 to 11
has been set as National 4-H
Achievement week. Attention is
called to the achievements of the
nation's 1,700,000 4-H club mem-
bers. They have produced food in
sufficient quantities to feed
more than a million men in our
armed forces. This year, 4-H
members have collected milk-
weed pods to provide floss for
the life jackets.

The National 4-H Achievement
week should mark the culmination
of 4-H club work for 1944 and
set the stage for results to be
attained during 1945. The
week may also be designated as
reorganization week as 4-H clubs
will be reorganizing, goals will
be set for the ensuing year and
membership drives started.

Achievement week in Douglas
county will be observed by pre-
sentation of awards to outstand-
ing individuals, club reorganiza-
tion, presenting of achievement
pins, window decorations and any
other means of advancing 4-H
club work in Douglas county.
Not only should credit be given to
club members for their
achievement but to those other
individuals and firms boosting
4-H club work—the Roseburg
News-Review and Radio Station
KRNR for their generous sup-
port from publicity and radio
time, the Port Umpqua Courier
for publicity, the Roseburg and
Gardiner-Roadport Lions club
for sponsoring this year's foods
production contest, the Douglas
County Fair board for providing
money for prizes, the United
States National bank of Portland,
Roseburg branch, for sponsoring
the five-year pin program, J. C.
Penney company for window dis-
play, Dr. Ed Boring for seeing
that every county leader received
a copy of the National 4-H
News. Appreciation is expressed
also to all the sponsors of 4-H
summer school scholarships.

The county adult club leaders
deserve much credit for achieve-
ments of 4-H club members, and
without their fine leadership, 4-H
work could not continue. The 4-H
people recognize and appreciate

Seal Sale Drive Stayed
For 6th War Loan

Postponement of the official
opening of the 38th annual
Christmas Seal Sale by the Ore-
gon Tuberculosis association and
the 36 county public health asso-
ciations in Oregon from Nov. 20
to Nov. 27, in deference to the
Sixth War Loan drive, scheduled
to begin on the earlier date, was
announced this week by Mrs. Sai-
die Orr Dunbar, executive sec-
retary of the Oregon association.
Dr. Kendall Emerson, manag-
ing director of the National Tu-
berculosis association, explained
in a New York interview that the
date for the Christmas Seal cam-
paign to raise funds to support tu-
berculosis programs in every
state was set several months ago,
before it was known that a War
Loan drive would be launched at
the same time.

U. S. Election Fails to
Enthuse India Editor

NEW DELHI, Nov. 9.—(AP)—
The first editorial comment on
President's reelection came today
from the strongly nationalist
Hindustan Times, edited by Mo-
handas Gandhi's son, Devadas,
which said:
"As far as India's own immedi-
ate interests are concerned it
was all twined and twined,
indeed, for neither the democrats
nor republicans are in the least
worried about the freedom of
this country. Both party plat-
forms contained scrupulous sil-
ence about India."

FORWARD TOGETHER

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT has been chosen by the Ameri-
can people to guide the destinies of this nation for an-
other four years. His successive elections authorize tenure
in office twice as long as any man in American history.

He has been chosen in a free election by free people.
That the election campaign was conducted in wartime and
in the midst of wartime stresses, yet with all of the normal
habilitments, is proof of the determination of our people to
maintain the freedoms and practices to which our nation
is accustomed.

The fact that President Roosevelt has twice overcome the
prejudice of the two-term tradition is conclusive proof of
the fascination of his personal charm and political genius
upon the American public. His election is a personal tribute,
for ample evidence has been given that the New Deal party,
which he forms and heads, is not the popular choice.

But the majority of American people, as shown by their
vote, have confidence in the ability of the President to lead
the nation safely through the troubled days that lie ahead.
We have been a divided people in our political opinions in
the past few weeks. But, despite partisanship, we have not
faltered in our united march toward victory nor have we
slackened our production effort.

Any bitterness created by the election must quickly be
pushed aside.
Crucial tasks lie ahead. These cannot be successfully per-
formed by a people disunited or retaining any sullen or
revengeful spirit.

The voice of the majority has spoken and it should and
must prevail.

Under the leadership of President Roosevelt we must con-
tinue to give all-out support and cooperation in every en-
deavor which will lead to the earliest successful conclusion
of the war and enactment of peace terms which will banish
possibility of future war.

This does not mean that the minority opinion should be
completely suppressed. It does not mean that freedom of
the right to criticize should be abridged. We are a free na-
tion and can remain free only as long as we insist upon ex-
ercise of the freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution.

But, just as we conducted a normal, vigorous election in
the midst of war, without interference with the purposes
to which we have been universally committed, so we must
continue with renewed spirit of unity to complete the diffi-
cult tasks that lie ahead, giving wholehearted and unstinted
cooperation in every task for which citizens, individually
and collectively, are responsible.

Save Your Waste Paper

Students in the Roseburg schools will spearhead an at-
tack upon one of the most crucial of war shortages Friday.
Grade school pupils already have started the task of
searching out and bundling waste paper. Friday will be
given over to collections.

The News-Review has a most selfish motive in urging
everyone to cooperate in this project. Here in the news-
paper office we are growing desperate as we contemplate
the newsprint limitation imposed upon us for the last quar-
ter of the year. We must make a material reduction from
the amount of paper used prior to Oct. 1, yet our business
keeps growing. We are practicing every economy and have
invested hundreds of dollars in new type and equipment to
help save paper. Yet our consumption to date is consider-
ably ahead of the amount we should have used.

There are rumors that larger quotas will be established
after the first of the year, but only if there is an improve-
ment in the newsprint situation. Consequently we are very
seriously concerned over the success of the students of our
schools in their waste paper collection.

There are, however, many more important reasons why
you should salvage every scrap of paper. Paper is serv-
ing in thousands of ways to speed progress of the war. It
is helping to save lives. You can make a very definite con-
tribution to the war effort if you will devote a little time
and effort to collecting waste paper at your home, office
or place of business, and making it available to the students
when they visit you tomorrow.

Soldier Voting
Ratio About Equal
That of Civilians

Soldier voting in Douglas
county compared very favorably
with the ratio of civilian voting.
County Clerk Roy Agee reported
today.

Applications were made by 684
men and women in military ser-
vice for ballots. Absentee ballots
were mailed to all who requested
them. Out of the 684 ballots for-
warded by the county clerk, 510
were returned and were counted
in the respective precincts in
which the voters maintain resi-
dence.

Soldier ballots were cast in
each of the county's 48 precincts.
The ratio of 72.5 per cent of
soldier votes was only slightly be-
low the civilian figure, Agee
stated.

No separation of soldier and
civilian votes was made in tabu-
lation, so that it is not known
how service personnel voted on
candidates and measures.

RHS 6-Man Grid Team
Blanks Carnas Valley

A six-man football team, com-
posed of freshmen and sopho-
mores of RHS, defeated Carnas
Valley 34 to 0 in a game at Carnas
Valley Tuesday, November 7. The
Roseburg boys scored eight times
in the game, with Tommy
Macovec scoring three times,
Dwaine Pope three times and
Edwin Harvey twice. Roseburg
completed six out of eight con-
versions. Roseburg's first touch-
down was scored on the third

play of the game, when Pope in-
tercepted a pass and galloped 54
yards to pay dirt.

The Roseburg team will travel
to Drain next week to play a
game with the Warriors. Rose-
burg has played one earlier
game with the Warriors, losing
38 to 12. But this time the team
will be out for a victory to make
up for the loss. The boys are
coached by Tunney Kennerly, a
senior in high school.

One of the highest qualities of
Roseburg senior high students

prepare for reuse waste paper so-
lited from the business and res-
idential districts of Roseburg.

The drive, although sponsored
by the senior high, depends great-
ly in the outcome upon the res-

will buy uniforms for the high

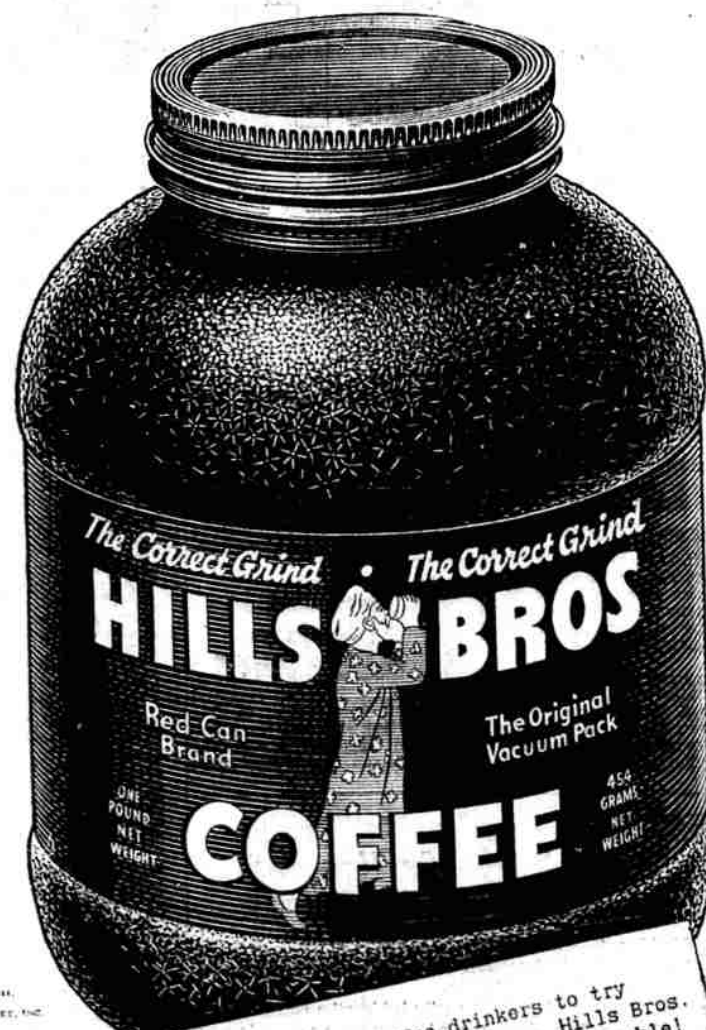
