ARMISTICE DAY 1944

TOMORROW we observe the anniversary of the armistice which brought to a conclusion the first World War. Today we know it was only an armistice; that it produced only temporary peace.

As veterans of 1917-18 pause tomorrow to pay tribute to their brave comrades who sleep in Flanders fields, many of them will be thinking, too, of sons dragging through muddy Italian passes, storming death-dealing German fortifications, bravely facing a treacherous foe in dark jungles on coral rimmed Pacific islands...

Armistice day, which is hallowed by sacred remembrances to the veterans of the first World War, today is fraught with bitterness, through realization that that sacrifice was in vain.

As we pause on the eve of a new anniversary, it should be our solemn resolve that the lives of brave men and women, dying today upon the far flung battlefields of this global war, must not be sacrificed to political jockeying, to selfishness, greed and money madness.

The veterans of that other war know now they were "sold out." Their pleas for adequate defense went unheeded, as we foolishly thought we had made the world "safe for democracy." Today we realize the words of warning by those veterans were wise counsel.

There is only one peace that will endure and that must be a peace which issues from the hearts of men willing to sacrifice personal enrichment, discarding selfishness and envy.
