ROSE BAMPTON TO BE HONORED IN CONCERT IN ROSEBURG, NOV. 18TH

Notwithstanding her several full seasons as leading dramatic soprano of the Metropolitan Opera behind her, Rose Bampton, the lovely brunette who will be heard in concert here next Saturday, November 18, at 8:15 o'clock at the Roseburg Junior high school, retains humility of attitude toward music that marks every great artist. The concert is open to members of the Concert Association only, as no tickets will be sold for the entertainment.

Although she has appeared on virtually every one of the great opera stages in this country, in Europe and in South America, Miss Bampton is still an eager student and takes every opportunity to improve her musicianship, to widen her experience and to learn new techniques and new interpretations.

In the days before the war ended its sombre light on Europe, Miss Bampton, with her husband, Wilfrid Pelletier, the Metropolitan Opera conductor, went to Salzburg every summer to observe, to study and to learn from the other great artists who were making the pilgrimage to that great Mecca of music. And each year she returned to America enriched by her experience and study and with her artistic stature increased.

Perhaps the most conclusive evidence of her sincerity in the manner in which she approaches every new role. One could readily understand a singer of Miss Bampton's stature and experience considering herself amply qualified to essay any part. But not so, Rose Bampton.
