The official tabulation of the Nov. 7 general election was announced today by County Clerk Roy Agee, following the official canvass conducted by L. J. Houser and Mrs. L. L. Wimberly. Clerical help for making the official count was furnished from the clerk's office.

The official results vary only slightly from the unofficial report compiled by the News-Review. The few minor variances were due largely to a few errors found by the official board on tally sheets where totals were inaccurately entered.

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Usuable Clothing, Bedding Asked For Foreign Relief

Donations of usable clothing to be used for relief of people in liberated European countries will be accepted by the Roseburg Ministerial association through Nov. 28, it was announced today. A receiving station was established today in the basement of the Methodist church, Main and Lane streets, where bundles of clothing for this relief work should be deposited. The receiving station will be plainly marked and will be kept open each day of the week.

The campaign will be closed the evening of Nov. 28, and no garments can be accepted after that date, it was reported, as garments received must be sorted, packed, labelled and shipped by Dec. 1. Particular emphasis is placed by the association upon the closing time, as in a previous campaign many garments were brought in after the campaign had closed and no space was available for storage. It will be necessary, it was stated, to refuse

acceptance of clothing offered after the 28th.

What Is Needed

The appeal is for good substantial clothing for both winter and summer wear. Principally needed are all types of infants' garments, particularly knit goods; men's and boys' overcoats, topcoats, suits, coats, jackets, shirts, all types of work clothes, including overalls and coveralls; sweaters, underwear, robes, pajamas, women's and girls' overcoats, jackets, skirts, sweaters, dresses, underwear, aprons, jumpers, smocks, robes, nightwear; and, in the line of bedding, blankets, afghans, sheets, pillowcases and quilts. Shoes are not needed at the present time.

No facilities are available for collecting donations, it was announced, and all clothing for this campaign should be left at the Methodist church.
