Oakland Marine Loses Arm From Shell Blow In Tinian Island Battle



Mr. and Mrs. Guy Cole of Oakland, Ore., have word from their son, Private Joe B. Cole, 20, that he is now back in the United States, a patient at Mare Island, Calif., naval hospital.

Private Cole lost his right arm when wounded in combat on Tinian island, in the South Pacific, last July 29.

He entered the marine corps as an infantryman Dec. 17, 1943. Following five months of training, he was given further combat instruction at Pearl Harbor and Maui island.

His unit joined the 2nd marine division which landed on Tinian July 22. Cole had seven days of combat before he suffered a direct hit from an artillery shell, which resulted in amputation of his right arm below the shoulder.

He was removed by plane to Saipan and from there went by hospital ship to New Caledonia. He returned to the states and entered Mare Island hospital Nov. 1.

He reports he is making excellent recovery and expects to be fitted with an artificial arm in the near future, and within a few weeks hopes to be able to spend a furlough at home.

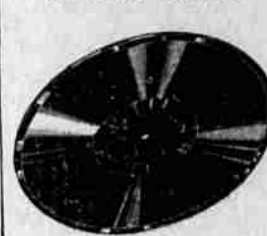

PROCESSED FOODS:
Book 4—Blue stamps All through 28 and A5 through W5 valid indefinitely.
MEAT, BUTTER, EGGS:
Book 4—Red stamps All through 28 and A5 through P5 valid indefinitely.
SUGAR: Book 4
Sugar stamps 30 through 33 valid indefinitely. 5 pounds each. Sugar stamp 40 valid through Feb. 28, 1945, for 5 pounds home canning only. For more canning sugar, apply local board using spare stamp 37.
SHOES: Loose stamps 1-2-3 valid indefinitely.
GASOLINE COUPONS: Not valid unless entered.
"A" 13 expires Dec. 21. Each coupon worth 4 gallons.
STOVES: Apply local board for oil, gas stoves certificates.
WOOD, COAL, SAWDUST: Delivery by priorities based on needs.
FUEL OIL: Current coupons valid through August 31, 1945. Not more than 8 percent of season's ration should have been used to date.
PEACE CONTROL: Better inquiries and complaints to nearest office of local board.
