and Truk, we SHUDDERED. We didn't see how we were EVER going to put them out of commission.

It looked like a long, uphill fight—and it was. But we WON. We put Rabaul and Truk out of commission by air assault alone—thanks to the grim, courage of our flying fighting men.

Thanks to the grim courage of our ground and naval fighting men, we fanned out from Guadalcanal and took the necessary surrounding islands.

THE Philippines are the Solomons ALL OVER AGAIN, but on a bigger scale. We're ashore on Leyte—and we're going to STAY THERE, as we stayed on Guadalcanal. From Leyte we're going to fan out to other islands, as we fanned out from Guadalcanal.

We're going to neutralize Manila as we neutralized Rabaul. We're going to neutralize Singapore as we neutralized Truk.

The Philippines, of course, are a BIGGER JOB than the Solomons. But we have BIGGER RESOURCES now than we had then. Considering what we have to work with, the Philippines will be no bigger job than the Solomons.

AS a people, we Americans are prone to jump TOO FAR to reach TOO ROSY CONCLUSIONS. When we got ashore on Leyte and in the subsequent naval battles smashed half the Jap fleet, we let ourselves think for a few days that the Japs were all but licked and the Pacific war all but over.

In the reaction from this FAR TOO ROSY conclusion, we're going to the pessimistic other extreme and thinking the Jap war as something that will go on and on and on for endless years.

WERE wrong BOTH TIMES. The Jap war ISN'T won. But it is going very well. In the Solomons we established the pattern of victory. In the Philippines we're FOLLOWING THE PATTERN.

We're tackling a bigger job, but we're better able to carry it through.

OUR fighting men know all this. They're jumping to no wrong conclusions. It's we home-fronters who are up on the heights one day and down in the depths the next.

THERE is an interesting story from Moscow. Nine days after Stalin called Japan an "aggressive nation" (these come close to being fighting words) Col. Ivan Tolchenov, a Russian military authority, tells a lecture audience in Moscow that the Pacific war is developing UNFAVORABLY FOR JAPAN and adds the STINGER that the "Japanese have ATTACKED AND RAIDED the soviet union SEVERAL TIMES."

The Russian censorship permits the correspondents to report that Tolchenov's audience listened in RAPT attention.

TOLCHENOV, of course, speaks with STALIN'S APPROVAL.

TAXES MUST BE PAID

AN irate taxpayer recently accented a county official and registered long and loud complaint against an increase in his tax bill. The county official, consulting the records, found where the district in which the taxpayer owned property had voted a special tax of substantial proportion.

Pointing out the authorized increase, the official asked: "Did you vote for these taxes?" "Sure I voted for 'em," thundered the taxpayer, "but I don't have to pay 'em, do I?"

Tax bills for the current fiscal year recently were placed in the hands of Douglas county taxpayers and tax collectors report a great deal of complaint because the amounts due are, for the most part, considerably higher than last year.

A good many of the taxpayers who are making complaints, however, fail to recall that they either voted special taxes or permitted others to authorize the levies.

For instance, the Gunter school district needed extra funds and called a special school meeting. Only seven people attended that meeting, but they levied a special tax of 55.8 mills. A taxpayer in that district raised particular "cain" when he received his tax statement, but admitted upon questioning that he didn't attend the school meeting.

At Canyonville only 41 persons were at a school meeting, which jumped the school budget from 23.9 to 35.5 mills. Forty-one persons gave a unanimous vote to boost the Oakland school levy from 6.4 to 12.7 mills.

There has been a great deal of complaint from the Reedsport district about high taxes. But the residents of Reedsport voted—and we think it was most commendable—to levy special taxes for a period of five years to raise a total of \$50,000 for improved streets and sidewalks, improvements to the water system, parks, playgrounds, fire hall and fire department. We believe that was sensible postwar planning, but it boosted Reedsport's city levy from 16.7 to 31 mills. Then, too, Reedsport was fortunate last year to have surplus school money and had to levy no school tax, except for the union high school. But consolidation was voted and the combined tax for school purposes jumped from 7.8 to 15.5 mills. Reedsport taxes would have been still higher had it not been for the fact that no levy was made by the Port of Umpqua. Reedsport's combined levy—school, city and county—amounts to 54.8 mills as compared with 31.2 mills last year, but the increase was voted by the people.

We have also heard a good deal of tax complaint around Roseburg. The Roseburg property owner's tax bill shows an increase of 9.1 mills. But we must remember we held a special election and authorized our school district to levy 6 mills annually for a period of five years to create a building fund. The remaining 3.1 mills of increase includes the 1.6 additional levy by the county, .1 of a mill increase by the City of Roseburg and 1.7 mills normal increase by the school district.

At Myrtle Creek the school tax was boosted 5 mills and the city tax went from 13.2 to 20.2 mills. Yoncalla added 5.7 mills to its city tax.

Drain was the only municipality in which taxes dropped, school taxes being lowered from 21.1 to 17.5 mills.

Our purpose in quoting all these facts and figures is not to find fault with any of the projects for which additional money is needed. We believe Reedsport's postwar fund, Roseburg's school building fund, our county fair grounds levy and other tax proposals, which will operate to improve conditions, are worth while. But, having authorized taxes, we should expect to pay them when they come due. Furthermore, when taxes ARE to be voted we should attend the meetings or elections in which we can make our objections, if any. The proper time to object is when taxes are being voted, not when they are being paid.

It may be small comfort to realize that a lot of taxes could have been levied which are not being paid this year through levies on real property. For instance there is the 2-mill elementary school tax by the state from which real property was relieved this year. Douglas county levied no tax for administrative purposes, having surplus funds with which to meet the cost of operating its offices and departments.

A few years ago we were paying much higher taxes than we are today, and were less able to pay them. Roseburg property owners, for instance, were paying as high as 49.5 mills, and down at Reedsport the bills were for as much as 87 mills. This year taxpayers in Roseburg are paying at the rate of 36 mills and Reedsport at the rate of 54.8 mills.

Myrtle Creek Six Wins Grid Battle With Drain, 42-14

Myrtle Creek high school's six-man football team won a decisive 42 to 14 victory over the Drain Warriors in a fast game Thursday night on Roseburg's Finlay field.

The Vikings' triple-threat game, Wilkins, running, kicking and passing, dominated the game scoring two of Myrtle Creek's eight touchdowns, throwing passes for two more, and intercepting a Drain pass, to put the Vikings in scoring position.

Drain scored two touchdowns, one near the close of the first half on a power drive down the field, with Barber carrying the ball, and the other in the last three minutes of play when Barber reeled off a long gain and Paris broke away for a 31-yard scoring run.

Myrtle Creek pushed over the starting touchdown in the first minute of play when, after taking the kickoff, Wilkins tossed a pass to Smith on the Drain 20, and scored from the 13 yard line on that down.

The second Viking score came near the close of the quarter in a sustained drive down the field with Wilkins galloping 15 yards for the scoring lap.

The Warriors then staged a determined comeback, powering down the field for a touchdown by Barber for a half-time score of 12 to 6.

The Vikings recovered a Drain fumble in midfield on the first play of the third period. Briggs broke away to reach the Drain 20 yard line and carried the ball over for a score on the next play.

Drain was held on downs following the kickoff and punted to the Myrtle Creek 10 yard line, where Wilkins caught the Warriors napping with a surprise pass to Smith who galloped the length of the field to give the Vikings a lead of 21 to 6, as the game went into the final period.

On the first series of plays in the fourth quarter, Fate scooped up a low pass in his own backfield and went 30 yards for another Myrtle Creek score, the Vikings adding another six points a few minutes later when Wilkins intercepted a Drain pass and then tossed to Vassell over the goal line to give Myrtle Creek a lead of 26 to 6.

Drain, however, was still fighting back, and one two series of plays went for a touchdown with Paris scoring from the 31 yard line. Paris then kicked the only conversion of the game for an added two points.

The Vikings, however, still had time left in the last two minutes of play to score the final touchdown for a 42 to 14 score, as Gordon broke loose for a 40-yard run after receiving a lateral pass.
