Rose Bampton, world-famous soprano and star of the Metropolitan Opera, will be presented at the Roseburg Community Concert's first concert of the 1944 season, Saturday evening, Nov. 18, at the junior high school, at 8:15 o'clock. Members only of the association will be privileged to attend.

Miss Bampton is one of the world's recognized artists in five fields of music—opera, concert, oratorio, recording and radio—and has been acclaimed upon the foremost stages of four continents. Back in the days when Miss Bampton made her debut, such an achievement was considered strictly in the realm of the impossible. The basis of her all-American training was the five years she spent as a scholarship pupil at Philadelphia's famed Curtis Institute of Music. Her first public note was achieved in the summer of 1929 with an engagement by the New York Chautauque Opera association. Later, she was a soloist at the Worcester festival, a performance which, in turn, brought her an engagement with the Philadelphia Grand Opera company. From there on, she steadily rose to fame as a leading singer and is acclaimed not only in America, but throughout Europe and South America.

Miss Bampton's concert in Roseburg has been arranged to please all music lovers and the officers of the association have expressed their satisfaction at being able to bring such a world-famous artist to Roseburg.

Roseburg Indians, Reedsport Braves To Battle Tonight

The Reedsport Braves, who will meet the Roseburg Indians in a football game on Finlay field tonight, will lay definite claim to the state B championship. It was announced today. At a meeting of the Gardiner-Reedsport Lions club, a committee was appointed to arrange a game Thanksgiving day between Reedsport and Chemawa high, Willamette valley champions, and the winner is expected to meet John Day high school, eastern Oregon title winners. Chemawa has accepted the challenge for the Reedsport game.

The Braves, in meeting Roseburg tonight, will be playing their first game under lights. A large rooting section from the coast city is expected to accompany the team.

Jack Flug, coach, reports the team in good physical condition and determined on a victory. The Roseburg Indians, on the other hand, are equally determined that their last home game of the season shall end in a win and will doubtless spring some surprises on the visitors. Coach Mel Ingram has been spending a great deal of time this week on "skull practice," as the team has outlined offensive strategy.

The Indians will be handicapped by the absence of Harrison, but Ingram has made lineup changes expected to give the Roseburg team a stronger backfield than played in the Armistice day game at Grants Pass, where Roseburg was beaten 12 to 0.

Bids For Utility Line From Drain To Eugene Asked

Bids for construction of 43 miles of transmission line between Eugene and Drain to carry Bonneville power to the Douglas rural electrification system, will be received at the Roseburg REA office Nov. 28, it was announced today. Contractors interested, it was stated, may secure plans and specifications from the Roseburg headquarters.

The line, when completed, will be energized at 11,450 volts. It will be built, however, to carry 33,000 volts and the increase in voltage will follow construction of substations at Eugene and Drain. These substations probably will not be constructed until after the war.

Announcement also was made that the Flora Engineering company of Cheyenne, Wyo., has been employed as engineering representative of the Douglas REA. The firm will supervise the award of the contract, following receipt of bids and will also supervise construction of the transmission line.

Oregon Legislature's Leadership Settled

PORTLAND, Nov. 17—(AP)—The leadership of Oregon's next legislature was assured today, with Sen. Howard Belmont of Canby as president of the senate and Rep. Eugene Marsh of McMinnville as speaker of the house.

The two men hold pledges of more than enough votes to guarantee their election at the legislative caucus Jan. 7 and avoid a repetition of the 1943 deadlock which delayed Governor Snell's inauguration two days.

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
