LEGISLATIVE WORK

THE Oregon legislature, convening next January, will have many important matters to consider as a result of action by Oregon voters on measures submitted at the recent general election.

Voters approved an act which will enable counties desiring to change to a county manager form of government to do so. The voters, however, did not pass upon any definite program of procedure. It will be necessary for the legislature to set up machinery for operation of managerial forms of county government as well as establishing methods by which voters may decide whether the manager form shall be adopted in their respective counties.

Two measures were on the ballot for benefits to veterans. One would provide state loans to aid in the purchase of homes, farms and business properties, while the other would authorize state assistance to veterans desiring to attend schools of higher education. The people of the state made it very plain that they desire to give every possible assistance to the men returning from the current war. The large majorities by which these two bills were passed indicate beyond any question of doubt the sentiment of the voters.

But both of these bills conflict, in a degree, with the federal G. I. Bill of Rights, passed by congress. The state proposals were submitted by the legislature before congress voted on the federal measures. It will be necessary for the legislature, perhaps, to amend the proposed laws to eliminate duplications and conflicts.

Voters also approved a measure which would restore voting privileges to persons convicted of crime but who indicate a desire to "go straight" after paying the penalty for their misdeeds. Restoration of franchise must be provided through legislative action and the method must be established.

The vote on the bill which would have provided by constitutional amendment a greater share of state participation in public school support was, we believe, a clear expression that a majority of the residents of the state favor the plan in principle but were reluctant to have it written into the constitution. We believe the legislature should give serious consideration to the matter of increased state aid to schools and reductions in school taxes levied against real property, particularly with a view to improving educational standards in financially weak districts. It is our opinion that many people who voted against the bill, as it was presented, did so because they objected only to the constitutional amendment feature. Enactment of a similar proposal as law, thus permitting changes to be made by the legislature, when conditions were such as to justify change, would, we believe, meet general approval.

A school authority, with whom we were recently discussing this matter, made the statement that in Oregon we have, to date, tapped only two sources of revenue, property tax and income tax. Some states, he declared, have found numerous other sources of revenue which have resulted in ample funds for schools, pensions, and administrative purposes, permitting reductions in both income and property levies. He contends that if the legislature will only break away from the present system of raising all funds from taxes on real property and income, liberal financial support for schools could be attained.

The legislature also should give serious study to the matter of pensions or old-age assistance. The narrow margin by which the Little Townsend Plan was beaten is indicative that pressure is growing for adequate security for the aged and infirm. There are too many adherents of "crackpot" pension schemes to permit this question of old-age assistance to be passed over lightly. Many unscrupulous leaders are making a fat living off the doles of hapless folk, seeking old age security, by expounding high-sounding pension schemes, which desperate followers can rationalize in their own minds because of their eagerness.

We are, as a nation, becoming more and more pension minded. We recognize that national welfare necessitates a fair measure of economic security for the old and infirm. But, until a sound and equitable system is provided, there will remain constant danger of the passage of some measure, such as the one on the recent ballot, which would prove economically disastrous. For that reason, if for no other, the legislature would do well to seriously consider revision of Oregon's pension laws to provide more competently for those in need.
