Jobs for Blind Persons Goal of Oregon Director

PORTLAND, Nov. 20—(AP)—A job for every blind person in Oregon is the goal of Clifford A. Stocker, new director of the federal-state vocational rehabilitation service for the blind.

Stocker, one of the first of 200 agents to be appointed in various states, said tests showed that 95 per cent of trained blind persons have proved able in factory tests to turn out work at least as fast—usually faster—than the average worker.

Blind persons can handle such difficult tasks as milling machines, lathes, drill presses and grinders, Stocker said. Among Oregon plants which could utilize sightless workers Stocker cited ice cream and candy manufacturers, laundries, bakeries, machine shops and airplane wing assemblies.

He predicted that up to 500 blind persons would be trained and placed in jobs in Oregon through the program within five years.

Crash of Troop Carrier Kills 26 U. S. Soldiers

LONDON, Nov. 20—(AP)—Twenty-six American soldiers were killed and four injured in the crash last night of a C-47 Skytrain troop carrier en route from England to France, air force headquarters announced today.

The Skytrain, a transport type that has carried thousands of men to battle, crashed near an 800-foot peak north of Brighton, in southern England.

"No cause has been fixed for the plane going out of control," air force headquarters stated.
