In the Day's News (Continued from page 1) pilots say there is a decided movement of motor transport eastward, with many gun positions being abandoned.

THE point is that the Germans are being attacked at EVERY gate, and dare not shift reinforcements from one point to another. They have to stand and fight where they are.

DON'T get impatient. Remember the fighting in Normandy, where day after day we smashed at a seemingly unbreakable German line. Then, suddenly, the line BROKE and we surged across France.

IT'S a little different in the present fighting. Only a few miles behind the lines where the battle is raging now lies the Rhine, which is Germany's traditional defense wall.

But the last-ditch nature of German resistance west of the Rhine suggests at least that MAYBE the Rhine isn't as strong as it might be and that no sacrifice is too great if it gains time to strengthen the Rhine defenses.

THIS battle won't be over in a day or a week. It's BIG. Much will depend on the weather. We have STRENGTH enough. Only the weather can prevent us from using it.

THERE is an odd and somewhat disturbing note in the news. General Eisenhower calls for MORE AMMUNITION—and adds that shortages in certain types of shells have delayed us.

His appeal is carefully worded, for the whole subject of material shortages is literally packed with political dynamite—bearing on the relationship of the home front to the fighting front.

THE Russians are apparently sweeping around Budapest to the north. Their tanks there are following a modern hard-surfaced highway—which is important at this season of deep and clinging mud.

LET US GIVE THANKS

TOMORROW we celebrate Thanksgiving day. It is a day when, as a NATION, we pause to thank God for all His manifold blessings, but when as INDIVIDUALS, very few of us think of anything but our own selfish indulgence and pleasure, permitting a mere handful of the devout to offer prayers of thanksgiving for Divine benison.

Celebration of Thanksgiving day in this country began with the first settlers to reach its shores. In the midst of deepest privation and suffering they could find cause for thanksgiving.

When man is in trouble he seeks God's help. But in times of prosperity or normal living too few of us continue our communion. The Pilgrim Fathers could give thanks in time of distress. We have continued the custom they established but we have lost much of the devout spirit which the day should bring.

In this wartime Thanksgiving our minds are centered upon those who are absent from the festive tables. We are thinking of the men and women in our military camps, those who are fighting upon foreign soil, those who are defending our nation on the sea and in the air.

Our government is making every effort to carry the spirit of Thanksgiving to our military forces. We at home will have fewer turkeys for our tables, because the bird associated by custom with our feasting has been furnished this year to by far the great majority of our uniformed bodies. But Thanksgiving day is a time for family reunion; a day when as family groups we are accustomed to surround a table burdened with food.

Millions of men and women, many of them away from home for only a few weeks, others absent for years, will in spirit and thought be united with their families and friends. Munching a "drumstick" on a South Pacific beach or dining on white or dark meat in Italy, Germany, France, England, or in the camps in our own land, our millions of fighting men will be thinking of home and of dads and mothers, brothers and sisters, sweethearts and friends and will picture them around the family boards laden with Ma's savory cooking.

As we thank God for the material blessings which have been ours, we also should offer a prayer for the safety of our loved ones. In that we will need no encouragement.

We can show our gratitude to the men and women fighting our country's battles by the purchase of a war bond. The Sixth War Loan campaign is now in progress. In no better way could we express our thanks to our sons and brothers, sisters and daughters, husbands and wives, now in uniform than for each member of the family to place a \$100 war bond before that vacant chair to symbolize our determination that the loved one shall be returned to his place at the earliest possible date.

Our thanksgiving can take material form. We can show our appreciation to God for His material blessings by a contribution to early peace. We can express our gratitude to the men and women in service by investing our dollars in bonds that virtually become tickets home at an earlier date than would be possible if we failed to join in the Sixth War Loan drive.

Let War Bonds form the centerpiece for your Thanksgiving day table! thrown 35 new divisions (maybe 400,000 men) into this fighting.
