SEATTLE, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Babette Hughes, playwright and author, who as Babette Pletcher, drama student, eloped with her playwright professor, Glenn Hughes, 20 years ago, has filed a divorce complaint charging cruelty. They are nationally known for the Penthouse and Showboat theaters, training ground for students in the University of Washington school of drama which Hughes heads, and for numerous books and plays they have authored, some of them in collaboration. They also translated a life of Balzac from the French. They have a daughter, 17.

International Unity Need Cited to Grangers

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C., Nov. 24.—(AP)—Declaring "our fortunes go up or down with the fortunes of other peoples," Eric A. Johnston, president of the U. S. chamber of commerce, told the National Grange here that an American economic policy for the rehabilitation of the world, is essential for this country.

Johnston said the plan must embrace "friend and vanquished foe alike."

"The small businessman, the small farmer, must be given every inducement, for they are the pillars of our economic and social structure," he added.

Supervisors Named for Oregon's Farm Census

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 24.—(AP)—Appointment of local supervisors for the 1945 federal agricultural census in Oregon was announced today by John A. Kallak, state supervisor.

The local supervisors, who have just completed training courses here, are James Rogers, headquarters Portland; Paul Plank, Eugene; Ralph Ackerman, Klamath Falls; and Victor J. Benoe, Burns; Lee Griner Alsea, and James Centers, Oswego, have not been assigned.

Kallak said 400 enumerators would be hired, with veterans being given preference.

Contract Let for North Unit of Deschutes Canal

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Interior Secretary Ickes today announced that a contract for approximately \$20,000 to further construction on the 65-mile north unit main canal of the Deschutes irrigation project, Oregon, has been let to the Harry L. Hamilton company, Eugene, Ore.

The canal, with capacity of 1,000 cubic feet per second, will carry water diverted from the

Deschutes river by an existing dam near the north limits of the city of Bend, to irrigate 50,000 acres of dry-farm land in the Jefferson water conservancy district, known as the north unit.

Barrier to Marines to Be Removed at Salem

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 24.—(AP)—Marines from the Corvallis air base will be allowed after December 1 to visit Salem, which has been out of bounds for six weeks, Alderman Tom Armstrong said today.

Armstrong said he was advised of the new order by Major Galloway, new commander of the base.

The reason for declaring the city out of bounds remains as much a mystery as ever. It was issued by Lt. Col. Neil McIntyre, former base commander, who refused to disclose the reason, and Major Galloway denied knowledge of the reason.

Oregon Gaining Heavily in Industries, Report

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 24.—(AP)—The state postwar commission reported to Governor Snell today it is "meeting with a measure of success" in encouraging new industries to locate in Oregon.

The commission said a number already have acquired sites, while others are negotiating for land.

The commission said that \$61,

535,797 in new projects has been appropriated. \$240,834.057 has been authorized, and that \$146,556,389 worth of projects is in the tentative stage, making a total of \$387,410,446 worth of postwar projects in sight.

Jefferson Mayor Dies
