LET'S not jump again to too rosy conclusions.

Remember that the German westwall defenses are shaped like a pully-bone, forking in the general neighborhood of Arnhem, in Holland, and running south from there in TWO LINES.

We've been battering at the FIRST line. The second line (which we have yet to tackle) lies EAST OF THE RHINE, which is itself a formidable barrier.

When we get across the Rhine, we'll be justified in feeling that we're on the home stretch. Until then, we'd better be cautious in our conclusions.

THERE'S an interesting rumor out of Switzerland.

A Basel newspaper has from what it calls an "extremely reliable source" a report of a German workers' rebellion in Cologne in October. It developed into a battle between the workers and the gestapo. Some 220 of the workers were KILLED.

The ruckus is said to have started when the workers shouted: "We've had enough of this dog's life. Give us peace at ANY price."

They got personal peace. ETERNAL peace. The peace of death. They were shot down by their own countrymen.

THE tale may be a pure fabrication. Still, it ties in interestingly with Eisenhower's reference to poorly trained, overage German troops thrown into fortifications and told they will be SHOT IN THE BACK if they try to retreat.

One can't escape the feeling that if and when the gestapo loses its grip on the German people (a grip based on the fear of sure and sudden death at the hands of the gestapo) there will be a sudden and terrible crack-up in Germany.

Himmler's home-front butchers are playing with dynamite.

THERE is nothing new from the Russian front. The battle for Budapest is still on. There are German mutterings of other red offensives from Latvia to Czechoslovakia.

IN the Pacific, the battle of Leyte grinds on. The Jap defenders are obviously prepared to die to the last man.

There's a grim story from Saipan this week. Marines with 900 DOGS have been cleaning up on hold-up Japs there. They have KILLED 246 of them.

THIS grim indoctrination of whole peoples with willingness to fight to the last man is one principal reason why we can't forecast with any dependability when the Jap or the Ger-

WELCOME, SHRINERS

ROSEBURG has the happy privilege today of entertaining nobles from Hillah temple of the Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. Caparisoned in gay fezes and colorful garb of the East, they represent the "playhouse of Masonry."

Some cynics are inclined to sneer at the antics of lodge-men. In our lodges we wear funny hats, put on aprons, hang gadgets around our necks, drape fanciful sashes, don robes, or otherwise invest ourselves with regalia and insignia. We go through elaborate ritual, making peculiar signs and motions which, out of their surroundings, would appear idiotic.

A psychologist probably would interpret our actions as being related to superstitious or voodooistic ceremonies of the aborigines. But to the lodgemen they are symbolic reminders of impressive lessons in human conduct—lessons that have contributed to a higher plane of living.

Fraternal orders are based upon great human and humanitarian doctrines. Through fraternalism and brotherhood—the stirring of deep emotions by symbolism—men are brought into a common relationship conducive to general welfare and uplift. Neither class consciousness nor bigotry have a place in fraternalism, particularly when seriousness is set aside and pleasure becomes paramount. When novices march tonight across the burning sands, personal position, wealth and dignity will be levelled to the common denominator of a collective hot-foot.

Little of the work of a secret order ever is known to those outside its membership. Its benevolences, charities and other good deeds are not broadcast. This in a measure is true of the Shrine. But the greatest work of the Shrine cannot be hidden, for it is seen daily in little children who can walk instead of going through life as hopeless cripples, in children who can laugh again instead of crying in pain, in children who are becoming strong, healthy, normal citizens instead of burdens upon society. Many men fighting in our armed forces today are defending the nation only because the Shrine provided the facilities by which deformities or remediable defects received needed attention.

Fifteen hospitals throughout the nation are filled today with tiny wards of the great order of the Mystic Shrine. Fifteen hospitals are earnestly striving to straighten crooked bodies or give curative relief to pain-ridden childish forms, because men who parade in tasseled fezes and bloomer pants have learned lessons in compassion and sacrifice.

Twenty-six hundred patients were discharged during the past year from Shriners' hospitals. Approximately one million dollars went into the work of straightening warped legs, backs and arms, healing disease-wasted forms and bringing a glow of health to wan cheeks; instilling courage and strength into those who now will be able to assume their rightful place in society.

So, Shriners, tilt your fezes at a jaunty angle. Let your band blare forth its liveliest tunes. Let your patrol strut with pride. Rope your novices firmly that they may at the end of their tortuous pilgrimage across the burning sands of the desert be assured of learning the great truths which await them—truths that stir men's souls to compassion upon little children.
