Caillaux, Former French Premier, Passes On at 81

(By The Associated Press) — Former Premier Joseph Caillaux of France, remembered in the United States for his unsuccessful efforts to seal down the French debts of the first World war, died Wednesday at the age of 81.

Caillaux' career included arrest in 1918 on charges of treason. After spending two years in jail he was sentenced to three years imprisonment for dealing with the enemy and was barred from Paris for five years. In 1924 he won amnesty and reentered politics. He was made finance minister in 1925.

He served as premier from June, 1911, to January, 1912. He was minister of finance under four premiers and held that portfolio in his own cabinet.

Caillaux opposed the first World war and from the start fought for a negotiated peace, opposing Georges Clemenceau. It was for his activities against France's war effort that Clemenceau finally ordered him arrested.

Caillaux married twice. In 1914 while serving as finance minister Caillaux was accused of financial irregularities by Gaston Calmette, editor of Paris newspaper Le Figaro. Caillaux's second wife shot and killed Calmette. Caillaux immediately resigned and devoted himself to the cause of his wife. The trial ended in her acquittal.

Yule Seal Sale Opens Next Week; X-Ray Unit Sought

Letters bearing Christmas seals to a large proportion of Douglas county's population will go in the mail the first of the week, opening the 38th annual Christmas Seal sale. Mrs. Ralph M. Church, county seal sale chairman, reported today.

Following the custom observed in recent years, contacts will be made principally by mail. Purchasers will be asked to return \$1 or more in self-addressed envelopes. For the convenience of Roseburg residents, a box will be placed in the lobby of the Roseburg branch of the U. S. National Bank, where envelopes containing cash or unwanted stamps may be deposited.

In the event persons receiving letters do not desire for any reason to contribute to the Christmas Seal Sale fund, it is requested that the stamps be returned immediately.

X-Ray Unit Sought

In addition to the various activities previously maintained by the state and national tuberculosis associations, financed through the sale of Christmas seals, the Douglas county association this year is working toward sufficient funds to bring the state's new mobile x-ray unit into the county. This unit is fully equipped to make x-ray examinations, utilizing the new type of inexpensive film, and able to handle several hundred examinations daily. It has played a vital role in early detection of tuberculosis in shipyards and war plants where it has been principally used in the past few months.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 24. — (AP) — Forest (Nubbins) Hoffmann was having a difficult time today as reaction from one of the happiest "Christmasmas" any little boy ever had set in.

Nubbins, his family reported, was having a "bad day" and taking only a little nourishment. He is still interested in the hundreds of gifts from persons throughout the country for his "Christmasmas" yesterday, but unable to enjoy them much.

The Cheyenne tot spent himself yesterday delighting in a "toy store" array of presents. He had so much he did not know what to favor but leaned toward a black puppy named "Slippers," sent to him by a fellow-worker of his father, and a red child's automobile which he could not use because of his condition.

Still in the favored spot in his crib were his familiar old toy Teddy bear, dog and duck which Nubbins calls Mamma, Dabby and Nubbins.

The 3-year-old boy, who may die before December 25 because

of a bladder ailment, rubbed the sleep from his eyes yesterday and shook hands with Santa Claus—Charles B. Dilbeck of Cheyenne. His first words, "today's Christmasmas," opened the family party and Nubbins plunged into a pile of over 250 packages from generous folk over the nation—plus gifts from his family.

William Jeffers, president of Union Pacific railroad for which Nubbins' daddy, Marshal Hoffmann, works, sent a toy automobile. His parents gave him a jeep, battleship and wooden freight train with candy-stuffed engine.

A Christmas dinner was spread on the table but Nubbins was able to eat only a little of it.

U. S. Robot Bomb Ready for Action

WRIGHT FIELD, O., Nov. 24. — (AP) — The army air forces disclosed here it had developed a "good" robot bomb that could be used "if we need it" and said the weapon had been in test flight since Oct. 11.

It is a version of the German V-1 which was loosed on England last summer, the air technical service command said in relating how it raced to reproduce the Nazi terror weapon in 60 days and then sent it skimming jet-propelled through the skies a month later.

Furthermore, its launching ramp is better than the Germans' ATSC said. It can be built in four days whereas the Nazis required two weeks. The ATSC did not disclose the location of its proving grounds.

Maj. Gen. Bennet E. Meyers, deputy ATSC director, asserted that "we may never need the robot bomb, for the army air forces do not go in for indiscriminate bombing attacks. But if we do need it, we've got a good one."

West Coast Lumber Board Has New Heads

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24. — (AP) — John D. Galey and William S. Lubersky, each a Portland, Ore., attorney, have been appointed chairman and vice chairman, respectively, of the West Coast Lumber commission, the War Labor board announced.

Galey has been vice chairman for a year and acting chairman since the resignation of Benjamin H. Kizer in October. Lubersky was assistant to Wayne L. Morse, Oregon senator-elect, when Morse was a public member of the WLB here.

George Quine, Jr., Ends Radar Service in Army

George Quine, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. G. K. Quine, Roseburg, has returned to his home and civilian life following discharge from the army which he has been serving for the past two and one-half years. He was in service as a radar operator at Camp Hahn, Calif., during recent months. Prior to entering military service, he was employed with the Churchill Hardware company.

Freight Rate Cut On Wool Sought

Alleging that present freight rates on wool "in the grease" in bags are "grossly inequitable," the secretary of agriculture and the war food administrator have petitioned the Interstate Commerce commission to make a general investigation with a view toward lowering the freight rates on this commodity.

They were joined by 25 state public utility commissions and state departments of agriculture who endorsed the petition along with 41 wool growing and marketing groups. The present petition is a request for reinstatement of an earlier action that was postponed due to a variety of war conditions.

USDA calls attention to the fact that government policy with respect to wool prices may be a dominant factor in the domestic price situation for 2 or 3 years following the war.

Prices of domestic wool are now being supported at a considerably higher level than the price of comparable foreign wools by the government's purchase and sales program, and mills are purchasing domestic wools only where specified for government orders. Unless government support is continued, prices of domestic wool probably would decline.

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Project Values Of 4-H Members In Douglas Shown

One thousand one hundred ninety three boys and girls in Douglas county have carried 1,924 4-H projects this past year. There were 392 animals carried as livestock projects. In 1924, 920 birds were carried in the poultry projects. Forty-nine canning club members canned 2,550 quarts of fruit, vegetables and meats and somewhat over 100 containers of jams, jellies and preserves. After the cost of the fruit and the other incidental expenses was deducted, the club members realized a profit of \$200.62.

One hundred ten clothing members made 56 dresses, 54 aprons and 441 other miscellaneous articles. Also 2,272 separate dishes and 555 meals were prepared by the 140 4-H club members who completed their cooking projects. In addition to these, 730 members carried health projects and 193 boys and girls in the eighth grade carried the marketing project. Thirty-three garden club members under ten acres of garden produced crops valued at \$1,802. Total valuation of all projects to date has totalled \$16,882.27 with a cost of \$3,743.87, or they have made a net profit from the year's operation of \$7,138.40.

The club enrollments have dropped somewhat this past year due to the movement of people from the locality and other families moving in that had not been in club work in previous years. The total profits realized by club members was somewhat less this year, but in most cases the quality of the projects has been increased quite materially.

Churchill Says U. S. Leads World In Military Power

LONDON, Nov. 24. — (AP) — The United States was hailed as the world's greatest military and naval power by Prime Minister Churchill in a surprise Thanksgiving address last night.

Speaking before 8,000 persons including American servicemen attending a concert, Churchill said the allies were moving irresistibly and "perhaps, with God's aid, swiftly towards victorious peace."

Never more than now have Americans had justification for "Thanksgiving," the prime minister said, "when we see that in three or four years the United States has, in sober fact, become the greatest military, naval and air power in the world." He added:

"It is a British and American Thanksgiving that we may celebrate today. And why is that? It is because under the compulsion of mysterious and all-powerful destiny we are together. We are joined together, shedding our blood side by side, struggling for



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
