PORTLAND, Nov. 25. (AP)—Oregon's war bond sales climbed to \$3,349,463 today, including \$5,514,537 of E type. The state's sixth war loan quota is \$107,000,000.

Trojans, Tennessee to Battle in Rose Bowl

Pacific Coast colleges' football teams for the third wartime year tallied up the season's results and made 1945 plans today as interest centered on the New Year's day Rose Bowl meeting between triumphant University of Southern California and undefeated Tennessee.

The 1944 college season ended Saturday with U. S. C. annexing the coast conference's Rose bowl representation by trouncing University of California at Los Angeles, 40 to 13, and St. Mary's preflight defeating University of California at Berkeley, 33 to 6.

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
