Dairy Producers' Outlook Brighter

With their production still considerably below war demands, dairy producers are expected to begin 1945 operations in a much more favorable position regarding feed and the price of milk at wholesale than they faced at the start of 1944.

Currently, the milk-feed price ratio is the most favorable of all the livestock feed price relationships. At mid-September, returns to dairy farmers, excluding production payments, were at the highest level for this period in 24 years. With the production payments included, returns were approximately 135 per cent of parity.

As encouraging sign that milk producers may cut down the margin between supply and demand during future months was the estimated milk production on U. S. farms for September of 9.4 billion pounds which was one per cent above production for the month last year and the first month since May of this year, when total milk production had exceeded that of a year earlier. The cumulative milk production during the first nine months of this year totaled 83 billion pounds compared with 93.2 billion pounds during the comparable months last year.

Seed Growers Aided by New OPA Definition

OPA has extended the definition of "transportation cost" in the legume and grass seeds regulation to include truck hauls of more than 100 miles which will benefit Oregon farm producers and country buyers which have truck hauls of more than 100 miles.

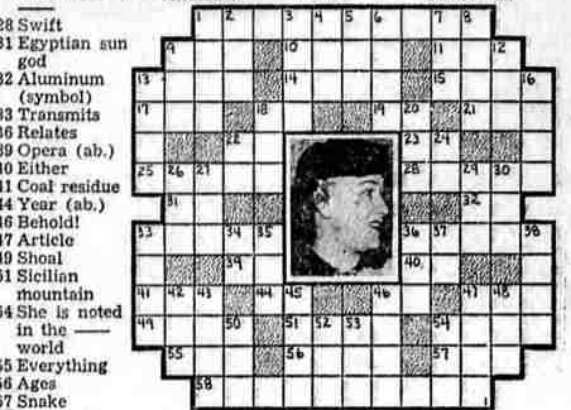

Says Tigers, Not Snakes, Top Bogey Of Booze Addicts

PORTLAND, Nov. 30—(AP)—A University of California medical school professor exploded the pink elephant theory today in a session of the conference on alcoholic studies.

Delirium tremens victims don't usually see elephants or snakes at all, Dr. Karl Bowman declared. Their most frequent illusion is tigers.

Bowman told the liquor com-

mission-sponsored conference that excessive drinking is responsible for only seven or eight per cent of all mental hospital cases.

"Even in these cases, after effects such as vitamin deficiencies, not the alcohol itself, caused the breakdown," he declared.

Three personality types which are poor marriage risks because they are afraid to cooperate with others comprise the selfish, cynical person, the immature person and the dreamer, said Dr. Seldon D. Bacon of Yale university.

"The alcoholic must learn close relationships by living with people, facing the things he fears most," Dr. Bacon stated.

Oregon Nut Crop Sets New Record

Oregon nut growers have completed the harvest of a record-breaking total crop of walnuts and filberts, the Oregon State college extension service farm labor office reports.

Production of walnuts in Oregon as of November 1 was estimated by the bureau of agricultural economics at 7,200 tons, 1,900 tons more than in 1943 and 200 tons greater than the previous high of 7,000 tons in 1941. Filbert production on the same date was indicated to be 5,700

tons, 500 tons less than last year's record crop but still the second highest on record. Total production for the two crops—12,900 tons—was a thousand tons above the previous high in 1941 and 1,900 tons greater than last year, according to the estimates. Although estimates on the value of this year's crops are not yet available, bureau of agricultural economics figures for the 1943 crop year show value of farm marketings of filberts at \$3,075,000 and of walnuts at \$2,258,000.
