STATE "CURE" PROPOSED

A PLAN to make the liquor business pay the cost of curing chronic alcoholics is under consideration by the Oregon State Liquor Control Commission...

City officials were told that as yet there has been no decision either to accept or reject the program.

It was pointed out that under the existing system it becomes necessary for the case to go before the county court in the same manner as an insanity hearing.

The proposed plan would permit the state to intervene when a complaint was made by adequate authority.

Smart men in the liquor industry are as anxious to control drunkenness as are the most ardent "Drys."

Oregon's liquor control law is one of the most effective in the nation. Its purpose is to promote a temperate use of alcoholic beverages.

Cooperation with the state commission has been exceptionally good in Douglas county.

We have learned in recent years to regard chronic alcoholism as a disease.

The legalized return of liquor, obviously, has aggravated the problem. If it is possible to place upon the industry the cost of salvaging the derelicts resulting from its operation...
