Lieutenant Robertson, the main speaker, was introduced by Horace Berg who spoke on some of the reasons why everyone should buy bonds.

Mrs. Doris Voorhies, chairman of bond sales in the Lookingglass community, was in charge of the program at the rally. Several patriotic songs were sung by the audience under the direction of Mrs. Mildred Ollivant, with Mrs. Max Pennie at the piano.

Following the program the salesmen began to offer bonds and approximately \$2,350 worth were sold. One group of ladies gave a piece of pie to anyone buying a ten-cent war stamp. Funds from this totaled about \$23. The regular bond salesladies will canvass the community some time this week to contact the ones who were unable to attend the rally.

Man Defers Trip to Face 40-Year Slaying Charge

ST. HELENS, Ore., Dec. 5.—(AP)—Elderly Benjamin Franklin Male is going to spend Christmas in Oregon before heading for West Virginia to stand trial on a 40-year-old slaying.

The 73-year-old Sawies Island vegetable-grower, who was sent railroad fare by Fairmont, W. Va., authorities after he wrote them he wanted to get the load off his mind, told Sheriff M. R. Calhoun he would wait until after Christmas.

Male decided to hold off after a relative advised him to obtain legal advice. Male, who has led a quiet farmer's life here for 38 years, fled West Virginia in 1905 after he was indicted for killing a school teacher that had lashed Male's son with a hickory switch. He told his story to the sheriff after his estranged wife informed the officer that Male was a fugitive.

Anti-Jap Action Laid To "Dual Citizenship"

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Dec. 5.—(AP)—The Hood River American Legion post today attributed its removal of 16 Japanese-American soldiers' names from a war memorial to belief in "dual citizenship."

The post unanimously resolved that the names should not be included until "they have completed their tour of service and/or a decision by competent authority has been rendered on their dual citizenship."

A spokesman asserted that any child born here of Japanese parents is registered in Japan, and that the Japanese government pays \$25 to the parents. This, the post said, was one cause of the name erasure.

Oregon's E Bond Drive Only Third Completed

PORTLAND, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Oregon shot past the half-way mark toward the \$107,000,000 sixth war loan quota today, chalked up sales of \$72,902,519.

The E bond drive, however, continued to lag only a third of the way along, with \$11,273,631 of the \$34,000,000 goal sold.

Balk at \$1 Levy May Cost DeMille His Radio Program

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Because of a dollar, producer Cecil B. DeMille may lose his radio program, for which he reportedly is paid \$5,000 a week.

This issue arose when the American Federation of Radio Artists issued a \$1 assessment for funds to combat state proposition No. 12 on the November ballot, described as being designed to establish "the right of employment, free from interference because an employee does or does not belong to a labor organization." The proposal was defeated.

DeMille refused to pay, asserting "I cannot afford to lose my rights as an American citizen, or my respect for myself as such."

AFRA has set the deadline for payment of the dollar at 5 p. m. next Monday, an hour before the radio drama hour which DeMille directs and narrates.

Yesterday the pioneer Hollywood figure released a statement in which he asserted the question is: "Can any organization, as such, usurp the rights of an American voter and arbitrarily make up his mind for him that he must support or oppose any proposition on the ballot?"

Declaring himself a union man and a supporter of and believer in unions, DeMille said after the election he was informed "if I did not pay the dollar assessment I could not work." He added:

"Surely this is not the free America we are preserving on the battlefields of the world today."

In answer, AFRA issued a statement declaring "AFRA considered proposition 12 outside the realm of partisan politics, regarding it purely as an attack on the right of a union to bargain collectively for a union shop—a fundamental principle of American unionism."
