## Curfew Law Put in Effect At Reedsport

REEDSPORT—Strict enforcement of Reedsport's curfew ordinance was ordered at a meeting of the city council held Monday night. The council authorized publication of the terms of the ordinance, which prohibits children under 16 years of age from being on the streets after 10 p. m. and provides for penalties to be immediately imposed by arrest or a second offense.

The council in a two and one-half hours business session transacted considerable routine business as it met in its last regular monthly meeting for the year. It was agreed to join the port commission and county court in financing repairs to the municipal dock and money is to be included in the next city budget.

**Four City Lots Sold** — Four lots, owned by the city, were contacted for sale and to be immediately improved by erection of buildings as soon as possible. John C. Diehl, realtor, requested that a block of 30 lots bordering the west side of highway 101 be reserved until the next regular meeting. He informed the council he is endeavoring to organize a group of investors to buy the property and erect 20 or more moderate-priced residences for mill and woods workers. The council granted the request. A request from Robin Reed, owner of a block of 14 rental cabins, for a reduction in water rates was denied.

The Reedsport fire department was granted permission to hold its annual New Year's dance Sunday evening, Dec. 31, in order to avoid interference with the dances held every Saturday night at the Legion hall.

A lease for two waterfront lots, used by the Reedsport Packing company and owned by the city, was renewed for a period of two years.

**New Officers Coming In** — In closing the meeting, retiring Mayor Cecil Bennett, expressed appreciation to the councilmen for their cooperation during his term of office and stated that owing to the date of the next regular meeting falling on New Year's day, the January meeting would be postponed to January 9, at which time the new members of the council, Mayor John Skaaluren, and Councilmen Matt Thompson, Andy Kneutson and Lloyd Richardson would take their seats. Retiring members are John Dye, C. F. Brown and John Skaaluren, the latter having been elected mayor.

**Ascribes G. O. P. Defeat To Lack of Liberalism** — PORTLAND, Dec. 6—(AP)—The war, and the party's failure to convince the people it is a liberal party, were cited by the Reader's Digest roving editor today as the basic reasons for the republican defeat in the last election.

Stanley High declared that only by proving it is a liberal party during the next four years and not just during the four months before the 1948 election can the republicans hope to elect the next president.

He said: "The party must start initiating liberal measures. It

must take the ball and run, instead of hoping to get it on a tumble."

## Travel Time to Be Given Some Woods Employes

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 4—(AP)—The U. S. labor department's new enforcement policy on "travel time" in the west coast lumber industry will mean additional wages for some woods employes but it is impossible to estimate how many may be affected, Charles H. Elrey, Oregon state manager of the department's contracts division, said today.

Elrey added that restitution of wages for travel time to and from work prior to this date will not be required by the division "except in cases where willful and continuing violations are indicated."
