Bruce Spaulding Boomed For U. S. Attorney Post

PORTLAND, Dec. 5—(AP)—Prominent Oregon democrats have launched a campaign for the appointment of Bruce Spaulding, Salem lawyer, as U. S. district attorney, Sen. Lew Wallace, democratic national committeeman, said today.

Spaulding, who was defeated by George Neuner for state attorney general by 388 votes, is being boomed to replace Carl Donagh, incumbent, whose term expires next August.

British Wives of Yanks Seek Visas to America

LONDON, Dec. 5—(AP)—The American embassy reported today that between 12,000 and 15,000 British wives of U. S. servicemen have applied for visas to enter the United States. Attaches said another thousand already have been granted visas.

New York City Lead Gave Roosevelt State Victory

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 5—(AP)—President Roosevelt carried his home state by a plurality of 315, 591 over Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, the final official tabulation showed today.

Roosevelt polled 2,478,598 democratic votes, 496,405 American labor votes and 329,235 liberal votes.

The President received 2,042,500 votes in New York City to Dewey's 1,271,287, for a margin of 771,213. Outside New York City Dewey outpolled Roosevelt 1,718,360 to 1,261,738 to gain a 454,622 vote edge. Roosevelt's upstate and Long Island total included 2,130,844 democratic votes, 107,824 ALP votes and 23,080 liberal votes.
