Health Clinic Dated
At Sutherland School

SUTHERLIN — Beginning at 10 a. m. next Tuesday, Dec. 12, Douglas county health officer Dr. E. J. Wainscott and Mary A. Barrett, county health nurse, will be in the 6th grade room of Sutherland School district, No. 130, to con-

duct an immunization clinic. This test is for grade school, high school and pre-school youngsters. Parents are asked to bring pre-school youngsters at 11:30.

The following prices will be charged: Toxoid—for diphtheria immunization, 30 cents; Schick test—to determine immunity to diphtheria, 20 cents; vaccination for smallpox immunization, 20 cents; tuberculin test, 10 cents.

The rise in prevalence of communicable diseases due to the war should encourage every parent to see that his child is immunized. School children who have taken an immunization permits home to their parents are urged to return them Monday.
