SAVING OUR RESOURCES

A DEFINITE step toward preservation of recreational resources in Oregon will be made if the state legislature at its forthcoming session adopts the bill to be presented under sponsorship of the Douglas county committee on recreation. This committee, named by County Judge Busenbark at the request of Reedsport and Roseburg chambers of commerce, has based its proposal upon extensive studies and consideration of probable trends following the war.

The committee proposes that county courts be authorized to levy a tax of not to exceed one-half mill annually, the money to be used to purchase picnic spots, access strips to fishing streams, and to develop recreational areas. Counties having surplus funds, not raised from direct taxation, would be authorized in addition to the one-half mill levy to earmark the equivalent of one-mill annually for the recreation fund. This feature would be of great importance to counties having income from timber and land sales, where the threat of destruction of scenic and recreational resources is most critical.

Someone has said that a tree can be cut only once, but it can be sold to tourists every year.

Preservation of scenic and recreational areas may work a minimum of hardship upon small logging operations, but the over-all benefit will be well worth the additional cost. Former Governor Charles A. Sprague, writing in *The Oregon Statesman*, urging increased tourist accommodations, says:

Here are some reasons for believing there will be a flood of tourist travel after the war: The delayed vacation trips will be put off no longer, once gas and tires are available; people will want a release from the tensions of war and of staying-at-home. The tens of thousands of soldiers and sailors and war workers who have been temporarily domiciled in the west will want to come back for a short visit or a longer stay. Also, more people are being granted regular vacations. This privilege is being written into many labor union contracts. It will release whole armies of people for one or two weeks of travel, and thousands of them will want to see the northwest.

When we hear talk of 60,000,000 jobs, that means 60,000,000 vacations, more or less. And the jobholders' vacation also means in many, many cases a family vacation, by automobile.

While, as Editor Sprague points out, we need accommodations for our tourists, we also need attractions which will keep them in our state. There is little purpose in providing camps, hotels and resorts, if we are to let our scenic areas be denuded of timber, our camp grounds destroyed, and our recreational facilities damaged.

Down on the lower Rogue river, a fisherman can travel for miles before he can find a place to reach the stream without being taxed 50 cents or more to cross private property. Land has been purchased by two classes of people one group wanting complete seclusion, and the other seeking to make a profit from sportsmen. At the rate this condition is spreading it will not be long until the public is barred from all suitable fishing spots, outside national forests, on Oregon's best streams.

The proposal submitted by the Douglas county committee is not an elaborate one. It does not contemplate extensive public holdings. It is intended, rather, to permit county courts to buy a few acres here and a few acres there, purchase access roads, trails or walks to the meander line of fishing streams; to provide needed improvements to recreational areas, and otherwise to protect the public's interest in the wonderful playground God has created here in the state of Oregon.

IN the house of commons, Churchill demands and GETS a vote of confidence on his conduct of the Greek affair—the voting is 239 to 30.

Characteristically, he wades in with fists swinging. He says Britain acted in Greece with full armed force "to insure that gangsters did not descend from the mountains and install themselves, with all their bloody terror and vigor, in POWER in Athens."

As to Stora (in Italy), he says: "Britain simply doesn't trust him, nor would we put the slightest confidence in any government of which he is a dominant member."

Summing up the whole affair quite clearly, he says: "All Britain wants in the liberated countries is governments which will GUARANTEE US THE NECESSARY SECURITY FOR OUR LINES OF COMMUNICATION."

LET'S not go off at half-cock on this Greek-British business. Britain (under Churchill's leadership) isn't just being ornery. She is pursuing what for 400 years has been her basic theory of world empire (the little island of Britain supports itself out of its empire). This theory (of official friends in strategic places) is as fundamental with the British as the MONROE DOCTRINE is with us.

The Churchill vote of confidence in Parliament is no mere concession to the fact that Britain is at war. The British PEOPLE, who are empire-minded, who know what butters their bread, would support the policy announced by Churchill in at least the proportion indicated by the confidence vote in parliament.

FOLLOWING the vote of confidence, British Ambassador Halifax says in Washington that the U. S. and British governments have "achieved an understanding"

ing" on the Greek and Italian issues. He doesn't amplify this statement.

One guesses that OUR government (in its hands-off statement) was merely outlining OUR position and had no thought of coming to a head-on collision with the British.

What Stalin thinks, we don't know. If he doesn't LIKE it we'll hear from him. He's that way.

(It is hard to escape the conclusion that Churchill and Stalin must have had some sort of understanding as to Britain's sphere of influence in Greece.)

CLOSER home, Premier King of Canada gets a confidence vote from the Canadian parliament of 133 to 70 on the conscription issue which he forced by his decision to send 16,000 of Canada's home army conscripts to Italy and the western front.

The SIGNIFICANT fact in connection with the vote is that 21 members of the QUEBEC delegation back King (36 voted against him). Canada's whole conscription trouble (tracks back to French-Canadian Quebec, and it had been assumed that the Quebec delegation was pretty solid. The break is a little surprising and quite encouraging to Canadian solidarity.

In deference to big Quebec, Canada's conscription law didn't permit conscription for FOR EIGN service. King decided on a showdown and seems to have gotten away with it.)
