Judge Assigned to Hear Howell-Bain Contest

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 11.—(AP)—Circuit Judge Charles H. Combs of Lakeview was assigned by Chief Justice J. O. Bailey today to go to Portland Dec. 19 to hear the suit brought by Circuit Judge Franklin Howell, Dept. 3 of Multnomah county, contesting the election of District Attorney James R. Bain as circuit judge succeeding Howell. Howell ran second to Bain.

Howell contends he should be allowed to serve two more years, claiming that Bain's nomination by an assembly of voters violated the law providing that candidates be nominated at primary elections.

PORTLAND, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Edgar W. Smith, member of the Oregon state board of higher education, declared here that present physical plants of the system would be "woefully inadequate" to take care of the anticipated postwar enrollment increase.

The bill includes \$2,068,000 in self-liquidating projects and \$2,237,000 from state sources.

For 15 years, he said, the state has made no building appropriations from general funds.

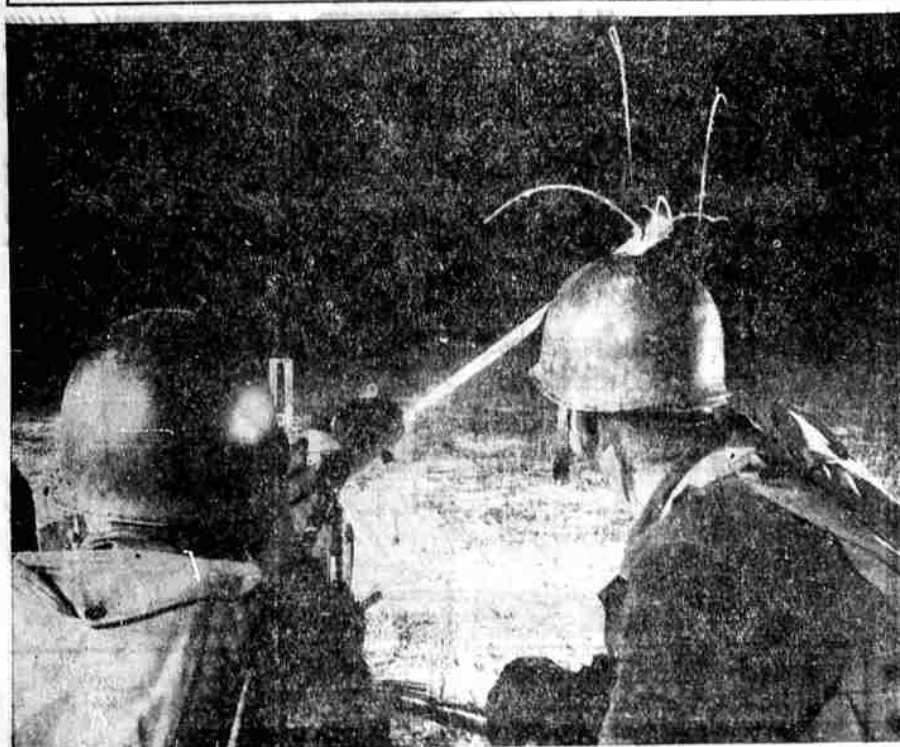
