great guns back in 1940.

OLL is probably modern war's No. 1 munition. Transport (railroads, highways, etc.) has ALWAYS been essential in war. It is even more so now.

The Germans have undoubtedly taken a lot of their war industry UNDER GROUND. But they CAN'T take transport underground. Building subways would be too slow. Railroads and highways have to stay out on TOP where they can be hit.

Watch our attacks on German transport.

THE Germans are muttering dire threats about a 1945 OFFENSIVE, new weapons (flying bombs of longer and longer range, underwater-breathing submarines, etc.).

The logic of the European situation says clearly that the Germans are WHIPPED if we and the British and the Russians stick together to the bitter end—as, undoubtedly, we will. Our disagreements (if any) will come AFTER the Germans are finished off.

In the light of this plain logic, we are justified in guessing that the Germans are making gory threats in the hope of frightening us into giving them a less drastic peace—maybe a peace that will save NAZI necks.

IN the east, the battle for Budapest grinds on much like the battle on the western front. The Russians are inching daily NEARER. There are no reports yet of Russian activities elsewhere.

THE Berlin radio says that non-essential civilians are being evacuated from Tokyo, with special emphasis on the old and infirm, children and expectant mothers.

There is nothing particularly startling to the announcement—which is doubtless true. London and Berlin have been similarly evacuated from time to time. So have other cities. It is the natural thing to do.

ALL SAVAGE NATIONS get their women and children out.

E VACUATION of Tokyo DOES give the lie to the silly Jap propaganda about little or no damage being done by our bombers.

IN eastern Leyte the Jap 26th division has been "eradicated." The entire Ormoc garrison has been "destroyed." The Jap idea of war is apparently STILL to die to the last man.

IN Australia, Admiral Sir Bruce Fisher, commander of the new British Pacific fleet, indicates in an interview that England's contribution against the Japs in the Pacific will be mainly limited to naval and air support.

THE Chinese claim continued successes against the Japs RETREATING from Kweichow province. FRESH REINFORCEMENTS are streaming down through Chungking from the

NORTH and it is now considered likely that these troops have been drawn from the outfits that for years have been watching the Chinese communists.

(Indicating that some kind of deal has been made by Chiang and the communist leaders.)

THE civil war in Greece is real. The ELAS are said to have lost 4500 in killed, wounded and captured. British-Greek-regular losses haven't been announced. Some kind of compromise to end the struggle seems in the wind. There is still no indication as to how Russia feels about this Greek business.

ON the home front, our new secretary of state, Stettinius, trots out his new assistant secretaries for the scrutiny of the senate foreign relations committee.

They impress most of us as good men—including Ex-Ambassador-to-Japan Grew, General Julius C. Holmes, Nelson Rockefeller and James C. Dunn. There have been interesting intimations in Washington that opposition to them comes from the wild-eyed New Dealers.

(Poet-Librarian MacLeish, who was included in the original list, may have ruffled the feathers of conservatives in the senate. Most conservatives are just naturally suspicious of poets.)

HULL's retirement as secretary of state is a great loss, because nearly everybody TRUSTED him. The trust and confidence of the people is an ENORMOUS asset to American foreign policy. Stettinius, so far, is showing up extremely well—as nearly as can be judged at this distance.

For example—He tells the senate foreign relations committee that solution of the problems involved in making a secure peace call for "the dissemination of MUCH FULLER INFORMATION ABOUT AMERICAN FOREIGN POLICY through the press, the radio and other media."

THAT is reassuring. The old diplomatic idea (which, history tells us, hasn't been very successful) was to keep foreign policy a dark secret to

be shared only by the diplomats. Such things have always been supposed to be far over the heads of the PEOPLE, who merely give their blood when the diplomats make mistakes.

Stettinius seems to have the strange, new idea that the people ought to be TAKEN IN ON IT.

More power to him.
