Withholding Tax Proviso Explained By Revenue Office

The revised rates for withholding income tax from wages, provided by the individual income tax act of 1944, apply to all wages paid by an employer to his employees on and after January 1, 1945, regardless of when the wages are earned. J. W. Maloney, collector of internal revenue, explains.

Under the new law, for example, any wages earned in December, but not paid to the employee until January 1 or later, are subject to the new withholding rates.

On the average, about the same amount of tax will be withheld under the new rates as was withheld under the old rates. However, since the rates were revised to adjust each employee's withholding more closely to his annual income tax, in individual cases the withholding may be either more or less than before.

Collector Maloney further explained that the withholding receipt, form W-2 (Rev.), for 1944 to be given by employers to all employees by January 31, 1945, must show all wages actually paid during 1944, together with the amount of income tax withheld during the calendar year.

If any wages earned in December are not paid to the employee until January 1, or later, such wages must not be included in the 1944 withholding receipt. All wage earners who may use these receipts as their 1944 returns file returns on the basis of income received during the year, inclusion in the receipt of any wages not actually paid in 1944 would result in incorrect returns.

Immunization Clinic Set At Fullerton School

The Douglas county health department will hold an immunization clinic Tuesday at the Fullerton school at 10 a. m.

Diphtheria and Schick tests will be given. The latter is a simple skin test to determine immunity against diphtheria. Doctors are advising all parents to be sure their children are protected against communicable diseases.

Dr. Erickson, assistant state health officer, will be in Roseburg today and will remain Tuesday to assist in the clinic.

Recruits for Seabees to Be Sought in Roseburg

A special interviewing officer from the Portland navy recruit-

ing station, will be in Roseburg Thursday, Dec. 21, from 12 noon until 6 p. m., seeking enlistment in the Seabees, it was announced today. Men between the ages of 17 and 50 years are eligible for petty officers ratings, which recently have been reopened in the navy's construction units.

Seventeen-year olds and men between 38 and 50 can enlist immediately and the plan of voluntary induction has been reopened to draft-age men, 18 to 38 years of age. If found qualified for rating by the interviewing officer, they may apply to draft boards for voluntary induction in the Seabees.

Murder, Suicide Disclosed by Son Of Two Victims

TACOMA, Dec. 18.—(AP)—A murder and suicide were revealed early today by Under-Sheriff Joe Karpach and Coroner Paul Melinger, who announced their investigations had revealed that the home of Harry Oley, 47, had burned to the ground about 3 a. m. The county officers said search of the embers revealed the bones of two people, believed to be those of Mr. and Mrs. Oley.

Mrs. Oley is the daughter of Charles Epps, who owns a tavern at Surprise Lake. First word of the tragedy came when the 43 year old son of the Oleys awakened Epps and told him his father was pouring gasoline over his mother's bed, county investigators said. The county officers said they found a suicide note on the porch of a neighbor's home. The note, they said, presumably had been written by Oley and was addressed to a daughter by a former marriage. With the note, they said, were several pocket-books containing approximately \$1,000 in cash.

Ex-Soldier Shoots Two Persons at Pendleton

PENDLETON, Ore., Dec. 18.—(AP)—Richard C. King, 36, recently medically discharged from the army after serving at the Pendleton air field, was held in the county jail today on an open charge in connection with a Saturday night shooting affray in which two persons were critically wounded.

Mrs. Myrtle Wallace, about 35, and Pete Doshen, about 50, both were shot in the head at the woman's residence. Doshen was reported near death.

The ex-soldier did not deny the shooting but seemed unable to give a motive.

Mrs. Wallace's husband, Alvin, is overseas with the Seabees.

W. McCamant, Oregon Jurist, Passes On at 77

PORTLAND, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Wallace McCamant, 77, Oregon jurist, attorney and political figure for more than 50 years, died in a hospital here yesterday after several weeks' illness.

From 1894 to 1917 McCamant was master in chancery of the United States court for the Oregon district, and was an associate justice of the Oregon state supreme court in 1917 and 1918. The widow, one son, the Rev.

Thomas McCamant, Lewiston, Idaho; and a brother, Bruce, Jersey City, N. J., and a sister, Fanny McCamant, Eugene, survive.
