War Training Program

Flops; Teachers Ousted

PORTLAND, Dec. 18—(AP)—Two heads of Portland's gigantic war production training program were dismissed last week by the school board after School Superintendent W. B. Spalding condemned the program as "inefficient."

The two were O. B. Badger, assistant school superintendent and Sylvester O'Grady, Badger's assistant in the training program. The much-debated program, which has been investigated three times, cost \$1,800,000 in the last fiscal year.

Spalding charged that hours actually spent by students were less than those recorded—basis for financial allocations, and that no careful check was kept on issued tools. "On three occasions," he said, "I went places where classes were supposed to be in session and found there were no classes."

Purchases of Used Cars To Be Probed by OPA

PORTLAND, Dec. 13—(AP)—Sol Stern, enforcement attorney, said here the OPA will determine whether transactions involving 100 buyers of used cars were fair.

He listed upgrading, side payments and insufficient trade-in allowances as the most frequent forms of OPA-regulation violations among Portland dealers.

Used car purchasers will be helped to obtain refunds if they have been overcharged, he stated.

Political Division of House Is Again Equal

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18—(AP)—The resignation of Rep. Magnuson (D-Wash.) left the democratic and republican voting strength in the house at a standoff today with 212 seats for each party.

Magnuson resigned yesterday to accept immediate appointment to the senate, to which he was elected in last month's election. There are six house vacancies on the democratic side. The equal division between the two major parties marks the first congress since 1930 in which the republicans have had as many votes as the democrats. There are four minor party members.

The senate lineup remains: Democrats, 57; republicans, 38.

State Laws to Govern Oregon Indian Weddings

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18—(AP)—Marriages among three Oregon Indian tribes must hereafter be solemnized under state laws.

President Roosevelt has signed a bill to the effect. Involved are the Klamath and Modoc tribes and the Yahooskin band of Snake Indians.

The new law also requires that all divorces hereafter shall be effected only by a state court decree.

Prior marriages under Indian rites are validated if recorded by the superintendent of the Klamath (Ore.) agency.

The legislation provides that no inheritances shall be valid unless under a recorded Indian marriage or a marriage under state laws.

Bid Call for Jetty Job On Umpqua Postponed

REEDSPORT—Word has been received here by the Port of Umpqua commission that the scheduled call for bids for reconstruction of the south jetty at the mouth of the Umpqua river has been postponed. The U. S. army engineers, it is reported, have built a scale model of the river, bar and jetties and are conducting a thorough study prior to start of construction.

While the postponement will delay opening of the port to ocean going and coastwise freight vessels, it meets the approval of port officials, who desire new improvements of a type which will give greatest lasting benefit.

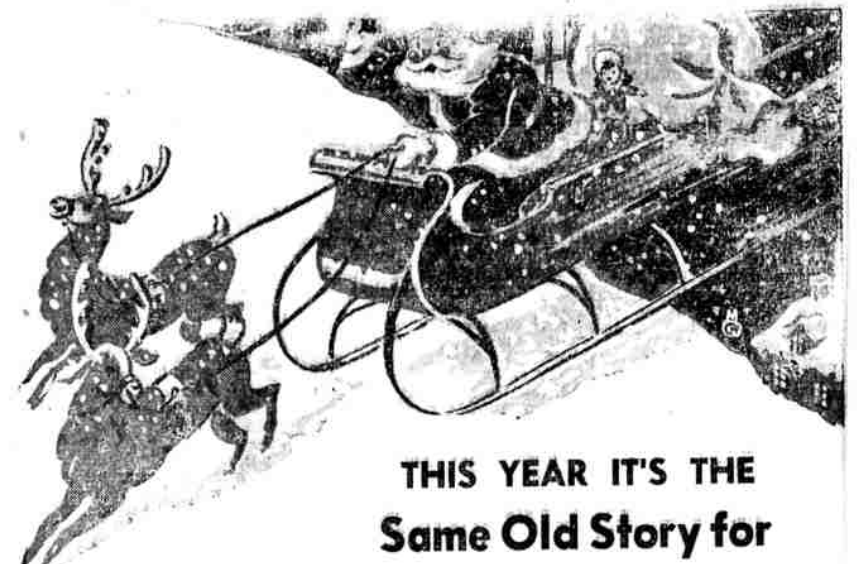
