PAYING TO BE ROBBED

THE Oregon Fish commission will ask the next legislature, according to news reports, for a direct appropriation to "improve salmon runs and combat dangers to fish life."

The Fish Commission, in effect, is asking taxpayers of Oregon to dig up thousands of dollars each year to subsidize a private industry which is deliberately robbing the state of one of its greatest natural resources.

Persons unfamiliar with fish and game control in Oregon should keep in mind that the state has two separate commissions. One is the Game Commission, which has jurisdiction over "protection and propagation of all game and nongame birds, animals and fish."

Each of these commissions, until recently, has been self-supporting. The Game Commission is maintained by license fees collected from hunters and anglers. The Fish Commission derives its revenue from poundage fees collected from commercial fishermen.

The Fish Commission will try to make us believe that its present deficit and inability to support its hatchery program results exclusively from wartime conditions. Its loss of revenue will be blamed upon employment of fishermen in other industries.

The law provides that the fish of our streams are the property of the State of Oregon and, therefore, they are the property of the people. But for years we have been permitting a comparatively few men to destroy our salmon and steelhead runs for the sake of private profits.

The people of Oregon must decide—and decide soon—whether they will permit a selfish industry, aided by a commission which has poundage fees rather than true conservation as a principal objective, to completely destroy the fish life of Oregon's coastal streams.
