Distribution Control of Lumber to Be Tightened

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21—(AP)—Tighter controls over lumber distribution were envisaged today by the War Production board.

The agency predicted that production from December to mid-

March will "be substantially below" that of last winter, with the greatest drop expected in the Pacific northwest.

J. Philip Boyd, director of WPB's lumber and lumber products division, said lack of manpower—with men leaving the woods and mills for work in other war industries—is the chief factor curtailing production. Scarcity of heavy-duty tires, he added, is a contributing factor. Boyd urged the industry to concentrate on better grades and species of lumber, calling the production of low grades a waste of manpower and equipment.
