A CIVIC CENTER PROJECT

ANNOUNCEMENT that Roseburg clubs have joined their efforts in support of a Civic Center-Swimming Pool project is, we believe, most welcome news to all residents of the city as well as to the county at large.

There is no limit to the possibilities of this project. It can be expanded into many important services which will benefit the entire county.

We sat in on a meeting of committee members sponsoring the program and find that they have great vision and sound reasoning. They plan to build for the future.

For instance, it will cost at least \$50,000 to build and equip an adequate swimming pool, it is believed.

Therefore, the committee behind the current campaign is not planning for this year alone but for years to come.

The plan was conceived by a group of taxpayers who have incomes in the upper brackets. To some of them a gift of \$1,000, as an example, means they are actually making only \$400 to \$600 out-of-pocket donations.

The City of Roseburg, by ordinance, has set up procedure for handling gifts, contributions and bequests, applying safeguards to assure that money, property, etc., so received shall go to the specific purpose for which a donation is tendered.

The joint committee, representing civic clubs, chamber of commerce and other groups, is making no attempt to prepare a definite program for utilizing funds now being earmarked.

But, in conversations at the meeting we attended, suggestions were made that a unit plan of construction be followed, building first a swimming pool. Next in order would be a public auditorium.

These are but the dreams the committee has in mind, but which it proposes to make come true in whole or in part.

To know that a group of business men has at last taken the matter in hand and is at work on an organized basis toward a definite goal is indeed gratifying.

It is a project in which every individual can cooperate when, and if, he desires.

School Safety Patrol Explained At Lions Meeting

A. F. Lefor and Sidney King from the traffic safety division of the Oregon motor vehicle department were guest speakers at the Roseburg Lions club dinner meeting held in the Rainbow Wednesday night.

"Mothers and fathers, in cities and towns all over America, are sending little Johnny and Mary to school each day with greater confidence as to their safety in traffic, because they know that school safety patrol members will be of duty to protect them at the most hazardous intersections," Mr. King stated.

"That parents' faith is well founded is proved by the fact that in the 5 to 14-year age group served by patrols, there has been a reduction in the traffic death rate the past 15 years—an accomplishment of which no other age group can boast.

"Lots of folks are asking how patrols are organized and more about what they do generally. To set up a patrol a simple survey is made of locations in the neighborhood where children tend to cross and where the most dangerous crossings are which need patrol protection.

"The principal, or a selected teacher, then picks out responsible older boys from the upper grades who are found to be interested in becoming members of the school safety patrol. Parents' permission for service on the patrol is required.

Tin Can Salvage Still Imperative, Chairman States

"That renewed and increasing emphasis must be placed on salvage of tin cans to supplement the dwindling national stockpile of tin is the declaration of Claude I. Sersanous, chairman of the state salvage committee.

"Despite the fact that tin consumption has been reduced to a minimum, the War Production board reports that the increased tempo of the war is placing considerable strain upon our dwindling backlog and a serious crisis in this material could occur before final victory is attained," said Mr. Sersanous.

"It is emphasized that we have only a limited supply of tin and even after the defeat of Japan it may take two to three years to recondition and retell the pipes from which we formerly received our principal supply. We must, meanwhile, not only draw against our bank account sparingly, but must add to that bank account in every possible way.

"Tin from used cans is our principal source of salvage and it is most important that community collection systems be reviewed and re-energized so that no cans go to garbage dumps.

"We must have tin for our war implements, for the packaging of food, for our armed forces and essential civilian supply, and for medical and other supplies for which there is no substitute.

"Because we have, for the present, at least enough of some formerly salvaged materials, the impression has gained ground that tin is no longer needed. The fact is that tin is one of our most critical metals and every housewife who saves and prepares cans and every person engaged in their collection and transportation is performing a patriotic and essential service in the war effort."
