More Hog Markets Get Definite Price Supports

The War Food administration has established definite support prices on hogs for markets and buying stations other than Chicago. In line with the Chicago support price, which is \$2.25 below the \$4.75 maximum price established by OFC for the support prices for markets other than Chicago and at buying stations in effect on Nov. 15, 1944. These provisions apply to good and choice butcher hogs weighing from 200 to 270 pounds.

Previously, a support price of \$12.50 was established on a Chicago basis for hogs weighing 200 to 240 pounds. Later, the support was extended to include those weighing up to 270 pounds, but no specific support prices were set up for other markets. This action, applying to other markets, was effective Nov. 26 and will be in force until June 30, 1945.

New Changes Made for Certified Seed Spuds

Seed potatoes may be certified by any person or organization whose standards are at least equal to those of an official certifying state agency, the OPA ruled recently.

These persons or organizations, however, must have approval of their official state certifying agency as well as that of the WFA. This action, effective Nov. 15, 1944, was taken to avoid duplication and expenses in cases where growers are members of seed improvement associations that provide certification service.
