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Spud Price Support Extended by WFA

Basic prices maintained for Irish potatoes under the 1944 price support program have been extended through April, 1945, by the war food administration. The extension is expected to encourage growers and shippers to sell at a normal rate during the remainder of the marketing season by affording them greater security against the possibility of declining prices.

Support prices in Malheur, Baker, Union and Walla Walla counties for all varieties are December, \$2.10; January, \$2.15; February, \$2.25; March, \$2.35; and April, \$2.45. For all other counties, support prices are 20 cents higher.

These basic support prices are for U. S. No. 1 grade potatoes. Appropriate differentials are set up for other grades through U. S. No. 2. Producers liquidating loans by delivering the potatoes to commodity credit between January 1 and April 30 will be assured of returns equivalent to the applicable support price. The potato loan program closes Dec. 15.

ROTENONE CONTROLS OFF
The War Food administration has revoked its orders limiting uses of pyrethrum and rotenone. Control over use of these two insecticides, both important to Oregon agriculture, now will be handled through War Production board allocations to processors and manufacturers. The revocation, WFA said, does not reflect any increase in supplies. WPB allocations will be in accordance with WFA recommendations.
