R. H. S. Grad Heads Farm Service Unit Of Radio Station



Burton Hutton, above, former Douglas county resident, has been named farm service director for station KALE, Portland, to head the new farm service department being established by the station. It has been announced by Charles E. Couche, manager. Hutton is a graduate of Roseburg high school and the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Hutton of Garden Valley. He resigned as assistant general agricultural development agent of the Great Northern railway, St. Paul, to accept the KALE position.

Daily discussions of farm facts and presentation of news pertinent to the agricultural industry will be the feature of the new KALE farm service, according to Mr. Couche. Morning and noon broadcasts will be presented daily except Sunday, beginning early in January. In order to facilitate the presentation of timely and practical farm facts and market news, close cooperation will be maintained between the new department and farm organizations as well as with local, state, and federal agencies.

Both Hutton and Couche are farm owners, the latter operating a 100-acre dairy and nut farm near Wilsonville. Hutton, director of the new department, is a graduate of Oregon State college, and for seven years was director of agricultural broadcasting at KOAC, Corvallis. except Q5, R5 and S5, which became good December 3, and all blue stamps except X5, Y5, Z5, A2 and B2, which became effective December 1.

OPA administrator Bowles announced that five new red stamps, U5, V5, W5 and X5, and five new blue stamps, C2, D2, F2 and G2, will be good for January, effective New Year's day.

The OPA chief also announced that point values were being reduced for most canned fruits, to make catsup and chili sauce. New Probe Said.

The weekend move echoed indirectly on Capitol Hill with an announcement by Representative Jenkins (R-Ohio) that he would reconstitute the republican food study committee named last year.

Jenkins at the same time termed the present food situation a result of administration failure to appoint a single food "czar" with authority over prices and distribution. He did not refer specifically to the OPA action but recalled that his study group several months ago had recommended one-man authority over food.

Leyte Mop-up Completed With Palompon's Fall

113,221 men, 2748 planes, 41 transports and 27 warships.

"This destruction has seldom been paralleled in the history of warfare," MacArthur said.

American casualties totaled 11,217, including 2,623 killed, 8,422 wounded and 172 missing.

Palompon Captured.
In yesterday's smashing climax, the 7th division captured the port of Palompon in a surprise amphibious landing under cover of a land based artillery bombardment by long range guns; the 7th division stormed ashore from landing barges to

seize Puerto Bello to the southeast; and the 24th division cleaned out Japanese around San Isidro, a port north of Palompon. The 32nd division and the first (dismounted) cavalry relentlessly pressed in from the east.

What Japanese survive are surrounded by these five divisions. The defending force has been "practically annihilated," MacArthur said, and only mopping up remains.

Manila Again Strafed.
Even the Japanese aerial counteroffensive faded out. American air blows over the entire archipelago were intensified.

Tokyo radio reported land-based American bombers and fighters attacked Clark field again today in their fourth successive raid on airfields near Manila. Twenty-one Japanese planes were shot down yesterday as Yank squadrons blasted through more than 50 interceptors to attack Clark field. Sixteen other aircraft were hit on six Negros island airfields, pock-marked by 132 tons of bombs.

China's Coast Raided.
Bomb carrying, China-based American fighters destroyed 40 enemy planes, sank a Japanese freighter and probably four other ships in Christmas eve raids along the China coast.

Japanese have ordered all civilians out of Nanjing in expectation of further American air raids, Chinese advisers said.

Emperor Hirohito's admission that the war situation was becoming worse was made in formal opening of the session of the imperial diet. Nevertheless he lauded his army and navy for "defeating the powerful enemy wherever he is confronted, with their death-defying gallant fighting."

The mikado shut his eyes to such facts as the destruction in the last two months of 1,521 Japanese planes and 89 ships by U. S. carrier forces under Vice Adm. John S. McCain. Ninety-two other ships were damaged. Most of these planes, but none of the ships, were included in MacArthur's reports.

German and Hungarian soldiers, captured 5,368 and destroyed or seized vast quantities of war material, including 101 self-propelled guns yesterday.

City May Become Shambles.
Despite the possibility of an attempted break out from Budapest, the impression in Moscow was that the Germans intended to make a stand and turn the city into a battlefield.

There were no indications that the Russians had yet commenced to shell anything but the airports and suburban escape routes to the northeast, but big Soviet guns were in position to open up devastating fire on defenders inside the city if resistance keeps up much longer.

Today's communiqué also disclosed a continuing Red army surge westward in southern Czechoslovakia along the routes to Vienna and Bratislava, now less than 98 miles and 65 miles distant, respectively.

At least 56 tanks were wrecked and the Nazis also lost 791 other vehicles. The Germans, throwing strong forces into the air, lost 409 in three days, headquarters said, for an American loss of 198, including 35 heavy bombers.

Activity flared again on the Cologne plain. American forces in heavy fighting advanced into the village of Dindem, four miles south of Duren, German bastion on the Roer river.

Canadians Capture New Point on Italian Front

ROME, Dec. 26.—(AP)—Canadian troops, striking out from their bridgehead over the Canale Naviglio on the Adriatic flank of the Italian front, have captured Rosetta, 10 miles northwest of allied-held Ravenna, headquarters announced today.

The Canadians were reported to have pushed on a short distance beyond Rosetta to within two miles of Alfonsine on the Ravenna-Ferrara highway.

New Pumping Plant to Up Eugene Water Supply

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 26.—(AP)—Installation plans for a \$80,000 city pumping plant on the McKenzie river near Hayden bridge are now being completed and equipment has been ordered, J. W. Arthur, water board superintendent, reported today.

The plant will increase Eugene's meager summer water supply.

Oregon's Biennial Budget Far Under Total Requested

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 26.—(AP)—Oregon's budget for the two years beginning next July 1, which Governor Snell will submit to the legislature which meets January 8, totals \$195,816,426, or \$3,285,718 less than was requested by departments, the governor announced today.

Budget approval was given for \$26,777,500 in general fund appropriations, while budgets of self-supporting state activities total \$169,063,603. The legislature will appropriate only from the general fund, and might change the budget.

As has been the case since 1940, a property tax for state purposes is not planned.

The budget calls for the largest building construction program in the state's history, totaling \$4,793,665, but this will not be in augmented unless the war ends. The program includes \$1,393,000 worth of new buildings for the state hospital, \$346,000 at the eastern Oregon state hospital, \$262,500 at the state prison, \$1,220,000 for the state higher institutions of learning, and \$300,000 for the state Fairview home for feeble-minded.

The largest expenditure in the budget is \$39,445,000 for the highway commission, doubled over the current biennium to allow the postwar road program. But this also depends on whether the war ends.

Public welfare appropriations total \$32,797,778, up \$5,000,000 from this biennium. It will be financed by \$12,043,583 in federal funds, \$15,054,195 in state funds, and \$5,700,000 from the counties.

Jap Air Attacks Fail to Disrupt U. S. Offensives

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—(AP)—Navy Secretary Forrestal said today Japanese air attacks have failed to disrupt American plans for continued heavy offensives.

Acknowledging that naval force in the Philippines area have suffered some damage, he said announcements are delayed because "we do not wish the Japanese to know what ships they have hit, nor to what extent vessels have been injured, nor how soon they may be back in action."

This "necessary silence," Forrestal continued in a statement, "has left the field clear for the Japanese to make fantastic claims, perhaps fishing for information."

"In spite of all the Japanese have been able to do, both with their navy and with their land-based aircraft," he continued, "we and not they are winning the campaign for the Philippines. We now dominate the waters around those islands and the air over them."

Bids Opened For New School to be Built at Sutherlin

SUTHERLIN — H. J. Setzer, of Portland submitted the lowest bid, \$32,750, out of eight, for the construction of the new school building at Sutherlin at a meeting of the school board, district No. 130, at the schoolhouse Monday evening. Fourteen bidders were present to submit proposals for the construction and equipment of the school.

J. K. Gill and company and the Northern School Supply of Portland, with a total appropriation bid of \$3,000, were successful bidders on equipment.

Others attending the meeting from out of town were: Mr. Stewart of Federal Works agency, Lester Wilcox, assistant school superintendent of Salem, and Freeman and Hayslip, associate architects of Portland.

Construction of the new building will start immediately upon acceptance of the bids by the Federal Works agency, in about a week.

Building Leased for Recreation Center

OREGON CITY, Ore., Dec. 26.—(AP)—A building to be leased for the next three years at \$150 a month will give Oregon City a

public recreation center, city officials said today.

Formerly a garage, the structure is now being remodeled.

civilians have been taken into custody, charged chiefly with having American equipment in their possession and selling it illegally. However, 95 per cent of this was delivered to their hands by Americans.

French military and civilian governments have stepped up their efforts to combat the situation.

A total of 184 American officers and men are awaiting hearings at the new series of trials scheduled to open the first week in February. All are members of two special battalions operating French railroads.

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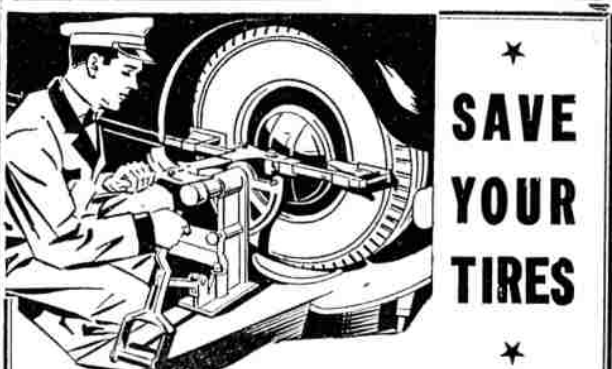
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
