Maximum Output Of Milk Urged on Dairies of Oregon

"All that it is possible to produce" is the goal for production of milk and milk products on Oregon dairies and farms in 1945.

The goal set by the state goals conference calling for 1,450,000 pounds of milk in 1945—an increase of one per cent over 1944—is a minimum goal, points out R. B. Taylor, chairman of the state AAA committee. All-out production is called for to meet minimum civilian and military requirements for dairy products.

An increase of 20 pounds in the average annual production per cow will reach the minimum goal without adding to the present 262,000 milk cows on farms in the state, Taylor reports. The improved feed supply situation, particularly in the case of high protein meals, will be a favorable factor in assisting producers to increase the per cow output of

Producers can expect returns at least equal to this year's levels, the AAA chairman adds. Market prices will continue to be supported at specified levels through government purchases of cheese, butter, condensed and evaporated milk. WFA officials have stated that although the dairy feed payment program is at present authorized only until March 31, 1945, the necessary price assistance to meet the goal—in this form or some other, can be expected to be continued.

Govt. Insurance Bill Designed To Include New Crops

Congress approved a crop insurance bill authorizing insurance on wheat, cotton, and flax, beginning with the crop for harvest in 1945; however, at this time it is not known if a 1945 insurance program can be put into operation on any crop.

Besides adding flax to the list of insurable crops, the new bill authorizes trial insurance on corn and tobacco in 1945. Up to three additional crops may be added each year thereafter. This trial insurance could be offered for any crop in 20 counties or less, but not for more than three years.

Insurance for wheat, cotton, and flax is limited to 75 per cent of the average yield on the insured farm. For trial insurance the same basis may be used, or insurance may be based on not more than 75 per cent of the investment in the crop. Thus an experiment may be conducted against loss on the basis of a different plan of insurance.

Other changes from the former program include: (1) The requirement that the premiums include enough to cover, in addition to unforeseen losses, a reserve against unforeseen losses. Under the new bill, after the crop year 1948 this reserve shall not be less than 10 per cent of the premiums collected with respect to any agricultural commodity; (2) After the 1949 crop, a pro-rata plan will go into effect. If claims for losses on any commodity or any year exceed the total amount of premiums collected less than the accumulated premium reserve applicable to such crop, the claims shall be paid on a pro-rata reduced basis; (3) After the 1949 crop year, administrative expenses are limited to an amount not exceeding 25 per cent of the premiums collected in the previous year.

The crop insurance bill authorizes an appropriation to the War Food administrator of 30 million dollars for payments to flax growers to increase the production of flaxseed in 1945. Payments would be made by the AAA. WFA has asked farmers to expand 1945 plantings to 5 mil-

lion acres—a 52 per cent increase over the acreage in flax in 1944.
