to Central Point where a new post is being installed Wednesday, and will spend the night here, continuing on to Central Point tomorrow. Legationnaires also will hear a talk by Kenneth Ford of the Roseburg Lumber company, who will speak on the Civic Center-Swimming Pool program for which more than \$15,000 has been collected. Mr. Ford is chairman of the joint committee representing Roseburg civic clubs. Attendance of all Legationnaires is urged by Commander George Caskey.

But the tables turned again and she lost in the general election to James Hamilton Lewis, democrat, whom McCormick had defeated for senator in 1918.

Her second husband was Albert Gallatin Simms, wealthy banker, lawyer and former congressman from Albuquerque, N. M. They had occupied adjoining seats in the house of representatives. The republican party rewarded Mrs. Simms' many years of work with party honors and offices, including that of national committeewoman from Illinois in 1924.

Specifically, the general named Sewell Avery, chairman of the board, "and other representatives" as having refused to operate the properties under his direction since the seizure under presidential order Thursday. Avery refused to recognize the seizure as constitutionally valid and said the company could not accept or obey it.

Gen. Byron also announced today the army seized two warehouses in Detroit, "necessary for selective governmental operation of the four Ward's stores in the Detroit area." This made a total of 16 properties—10 retail stores, 3 mail order houses and 3 warehouses—now under army control.

Federal court determination of the issues awaits a hearing Jan. 8 of a government petition for a declaratory judgment to establish legality of President Roosevelt's seizure order, caused by Ward's refusal to comply with War Labor board directives, and for an injunction to prevent company interference with army operations.

Washington knew her first as the daughter and secretary of the powerful senator from Ohio, Marcus A. Hanna, "maker of presidents," next as the very active wife of Senator Medill McCormick of Illinois and then, after his death 1925, the nation, and especially Illinois, became conscious of her as a vital individual political force.

Utilizing her father's tactics of carrying a campaign personally to the voters, she stumped Illinois and won election as congresswoman-at-large in 1928, polling the largest plurality accorded any of her republican teammates, even President Hoover.

In 1929 she announced her candidacy for United States senator from Illinois, and thundering

West Salem Cannery Burned; Loss \$750,000

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 2—Damage estimated at \$750,000, according to Charles Martin, president, resulted early Sunday morning when the Blue Lake cannery in West Salem was destroyed by fire. Martin said the fire was appar-

ently of incendiary origin. Several loaded box cars on a siding were also destroyed.

The cannery, operated by more than 100 growers in the Salem area on a co-op basis, had more than \$500,000 worth of canned goods stored in the plant. Company property was valued at \$250,000 Martin said.
