A federal appropriation, totalling more than \$5,000, recently was made available to the city to aid in the program.

Yanks Firm Against Nazi Jobs on Western Front

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The 36-hour news embargo on the Belgian salient and disclosed that the perimeter of the Nazi bulge has been comparatively stabilized. Third army units advanced to a point four miles northeast of Bastogne in the southern flank. There were signs of German movement eastward as allied air forces poised for a trap should the enemy attempt large-scale withdrawals. Cold weather has curtailed tactical air support on both sides.

The German losses in the air in the Monday attacks on allied bases behind the lines now were estimated at 363 planes, the greatest single day's loss of the war. U. S. bombers attacked masses of German war materials behind the lines, executing the 12th day light attack in as many days. Last night RAF bomber squadrons attacked Berlin, Nurnberg and Ludwigsafen. The British and American air forces had teamed in two 1,000-bomber attacks, one by day and one by night. The targets were largely freight trains, rail yards, night's interceptions and troop and armored concentrations.

Greek Peace Sought
Gen. Nicholas Plastiras, veteran Greek soldier, undertook today the formation of a new all-party government, for Greece, in hopes of ending weeks of civil strife. At the request of Regent Archbishop Damaskinos, he agreed to assume the premiership, abandoned by Papandreu when he failed to restore harmony.

In Italy, Canadian troops battering toward Anzio on the Ravenna-Ferrara highway have gained ground between the Posso Vecchia and the S. U. river against stiff German resistance. A number of enemy strongpoints were cleared.

Development of the harbors of the northwest to accommodate liberty and victory ships also is prominent on the northwestern program. Senator Cordon (R-Ore.), member of the commerce committee, declared the rivers and harbors bill is of greatest importance to the two states on that account.

Cordon and Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.) expect to reintroduce their bill to settle the administration of the Oregon-California grant lands.

Senator Morse (R-Ore.), who succeeds Senator Holman, proposes to aid in advancing air service to the northwest.

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command base at Saipan. Tokyo claimed that 17 Superforts were shot down and 25 damaged. The enemy communique claimed three were brought down by suicide interceptors but at the same time said only two fighters had failed to return.

The communique admitted "some damages were inflicted in the Nagoya and Hamamatsu areas by enemy incendiary bombs," an unusual concession from imperial headquarters.

Formosa Now Included
Philippines-based Liberators opened 1945 with a smashing New Year's day strike at Manila's Clark field. Returning pilots said escorting fighters took care of every enemy interceptor.

Air patrols sweeping waters hundreds of miles north of the Philippines brought Formosa into General MacArthur's communique for the first time. They shot down four Japanese planes and left five coastal vessels in flames. Every part of the Japanese empire is now within reach of American bombers. Most sections can be hit by Liberators.

leaving B-29s to concentrate on Japan after the heavily industrialized section of the continent.

Significantly, one of Emperor Hirohito's palace advisers remarked that shortages of war materials was all that permitted the violent enemy counterattacks.

Jap Raids Futile
Nipponese planes made an abortive sortie against the Salpan Superfort base while Liberators hit the raider's home field on two Jima for the 25th consecutive day.

Continued U. S. air strikes over the entire Philippines area coincided with a warning from Lt. Gen. Homma, former commander in the islands, that the Americans were preparing to invade Luzon. Heaviest raids were directed at Luzon, where a gunboat and freighter were sunk off the coast.

Land action followed its recent pattern—778 more Japanese killed in the Leyte island death-trap, and sweeping British advances in Burma.

Jungle troops of the British 14th army moved unopposed into Yeu, 70 air miles northwest of Mandalay. Three highways fan out to the south and east from Yeu. This city is on the west flank of the Myitkyina-Mandalay-Rangoon railway, down which other British units are advancing.

G. O. P. Spends More Than Democrats in Election

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Democratic and republican national committees spent \$4,881,773.14 in the 1944 presidential campaign.

Reports filed with congress today—exclusive of state campaign expenses—showed the democrats spent \$2,656,121.58 to re-elect President Roosevelt to a fourth term.

The republican committee said it spent \$2,225,651.56 in its unsuccessful campaign for Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York. The major party reports showed the republicans took in \$2,999,999.48—52 cents under the legal ceiling—in contributions and other receipts for the 1944 campaign.

Democratic contributions and other receipts were listed at 2,056,121.58.

The democratic accounting showed National Chairman Robert E. Hannegan's weekly campaign salary at \$384.61. No salary was listed for Republican National Chairman Herbert Brownell.

Russians Gain in Bloody Combat for Budapest

Forty-two miles northwest of Budapest fresh German armored forces drawn from Austria last night yesterday at the tip of the Russian salient on the main road to Vienna. It was announced officially the attack was repulsed.

Although this counterattack was too far distant to affect the fate of the Germans cut off in Budapest, a force of the latter, possibly in sheer desperation, tried and failed to break out of the western part of the Hungarian capital.
