BOYS ON BICYCLES

DRIVING home one evening recently we overtook two boys riding bicycles. As we touched the horn button lightly to let them know we were approaching, one of the youngsters impishly turned his bicycle directly in front of our automobile, leaning at us as he did so, then turned sharply back to the right. As he made the second quick turn, his bicycle skidded and he sprawled on the pavement directly in front of our car.

Fortunately, we were travelling at slow speed and made a skidding stop thus avoiding hitting him. We should have stopped and given him a good padding, but we were so weak and shaken that we couldn't have made a sufficiently lasting impression on the spot where such impressions should be made, so we crawled on home and lay on the davenport until our nerves quit jumping.

Roseburg has had six serious accidents in as many weeks involving boys on bicycles struck by automobiles. The fact that we have not had ten times that number is a tribute to caution used by the average motorist. Certainly the fact we have not had more than an average of one accident per week is not due to careful conduct by bicycle riders.

Erwin Short, city police chief, reports police officers have been ordered to "crack down" on youngsters who fail to obey bicycle regulations. The riders know the rules, for following provisions of an ordinance adopted several years ago by the city council, every bicycle must be licensed and the rider must pass an examination on road rules before the license is issued. Therefore, there is no excuse for ignorance of the law.

One of the principal violations is that of riding improperly lighted bicycles after dark. Nearly all of the accidents have resulted from the fact that youths were riding vehicles having no lights or inadequate lights. Many youngsters depend upon a hand flashlight, which usually is pointed straight down, and cannot be seen by an approaching motorist, particularly if the driver is facing the lights of an automobile coming from the opposite direction.

The city police should be encouraged to require observance of the bicycle code. Such enforcement is desirable, not only from the standpoint of saving lives, but training children in the need for traffic caution while they are in the bicycle stage assures safer drivers when they become old enough to operate an automobile.

Policemen report, however, that instead of encouraging law enforcement, many parents become quite irate when officers charge children with infractions of bicycle regulations. It has been the practice of the city officials to confiscate bicycles ridden in violation of law and to hold the vehicles for periods of time commensurate with the gravity of the offense.

It would seem that parents would appreciate efforts of the police to safeguard the lives of their children and the attempt to educate youngsters in traffic safety, but altogether too many parents are vociferously antagonistic when junior's bicycle is impounded.

Fair warning is being given by the police of intention to engage in more rigid enforcement of bicycle rules. We believe this will be welcome news to the majority of automobile drivers. It also should be good news to parents of youngsters who ride bicycles, and the police should have encouragement and cooperation in their work.

Deadline on Filing Tax Statements For 1944 is Cited

J. W. Maloney, collector of internal revenue, reminded taxpayers in this district today that January 15 is the deadline for filing original or amended 1944 declarations of estimated tax and for paying installments on previously-filed declarations for 1944. Nearly all farmers are required to file original 1944 declarations by January 15. Most other taxpayers who were required to file 1944 declarations did so last April, but those who underestimated their tax by more than 20 per cent should file amended declarations to avoid the penalty for substantial underestimates. January 15, likewise, is the last day for paying all installments due on 1944 declarations. Mr. Maloney also called attention to the new provision of law which permits a taxpayer to file his annual income tax return for 1944 and pay the tax due on the return by January 15, instead of filing or paying estimated tax otherwise due at that time. Taxpayers availing themselves of this special provision will be saved the double duty of filing and paying "estimated tax" on January 15 and filing and paying on the annual return March 15. March 15 remains the regular deadline for filing 1944 annual returns and 1945 declarations of estimated tax.
