Superior forces from China also hit Formosa while B-29s from Saipan bombed Tokyo. A Japanese imperial communiqué said 60 Superforts came over the imperial capital in waves in mid-afternoon.

A new flood of Tokyo broadcasts did not repeat previous stories of U. S. landing attempts in the Philippines, but told of American convoys of more than 210 transports and 20 carriers, plus uncounted warships en route from the Marianas and New Guinea.

Domei indicated some concern about the destination of a convoy southwest of Luzon, reportedly carrying three American divisions.

Lt. Gen. Homma, Japanese commander of the Philippines, said the Yanks must land on Lingayen gulf but probably would "attempt landings at various other places."

Manila Fields Blasted

In 48 hours of unchecked operations over Luzon, navy and marine planes from Vice Adm. McCain's carrier force, and army Philippines-based bombers and fighters blasted airfields on either side of Manila, destroyed at least 140 planes, sent Nipponese shipping fleeing into the China sea, raised havoc with Japanese communications and established a blockade against potential air reinforcements from Formosa.

On these same two days, Saturday and Sunday, MacArthur's army destroyed 74 planes, mostly caught on the ground.

Anzacs Relieve Yanks

MacArthur announced that Australian and New Zealand troops have relieved American soldiers in the Solomons, New Britain and New Guinea where tens of thousands of Japanese have been cut off. The Yanks, now available for duty in the Philippines, left the southern islands secretly last November. Since then the Australians have inflicted ten Japanese casualties for every one they suffered.

A recapitulation of American communiqués showed that in December, for the fourth successive month, Nippon lost 1,000 warplanes.

Paramushiro Ruin Revealed

Aerial photographs revealed four Japanese buildings at Suri-machi on Paramushiro island were destroyed. 16 others damaged and an airstrip rendered temporarily inoperative by a Jan. 5 shelling of the island.

Rear Admiral John L. McCrea, commander of a cruiser and destroyer task force which hurled thousands of shells into enemy installations at dusk, said the operation was a total surprise to the Japanese.

Enemy shore fire was meager and inaccurate. The American ships escaped damage and there were no casualties. The attack was against the three largest Japanese canneries in the northern Kuriles. The Japanese fishing fleet operating in this area of the northern Pacific in the summer supplies a large portion of the nation's sea food, which is canned in the Kuriles.

yesterday against weak opposition. Marshal von Rundstedt was forced to use secondary roads as he fell back. He was believed preparing for a stand at St. Vith, four miles from the Reich and 36 miles to the rear of his deepest penetration.

The Sixth army group in eastern France blocked Nazi progress for weak spots in Alsace and Lorraine, and far to the north the British have wiped out a German bridgehead across the Mass (Meuse) river north of Venlo in Holland.

Russians Halt Nazis
Red army troops have halted the big German counterattack northwest of Budapest and considerably slowed the attack beating on the west of the Hungarian capital. Moscow dispatches said today.

Within 24 hours, the soviet army recaptured the initiative against the nazis who have struck to within 15 miles of Budapest on the northwest, reports said. Hand-to-hand fighting meanwhile was stepped up inside the capital. Soviet forces hitting along the north bank of the Danube, approached within gun range of

Anti-Nazi Unrest, Sabotage Prevalent in Germany, With Communists in Major Role

BERN, Jan. 9. (AP)—New and possibly significant signs of anti-Nazi resistance appear to be springing up in Germany.

Due allowance must be made for the possibility that reports on conditions inside the Reich are colored by German propaganda, but usually trustworthy private channels and German newspapers themselves give this picture:

The communists are the best organized and the most persistent element working for the overthrow of the Hitler regime. The need for food causes another large group to commit regular subversive acts against the nazis. Fully pre-arranged organizations are almost non-existent.

The position of the industrialists who accepted and liked Hitler in the beginning admittedly is obscure, but some sources say these businessmen now feel that Hitler and the nazis must go in the interests of shrewd maneuvering that might bring a peace which would save German industrial production.

Slave Labor Perilous
Imported slave labor forms the nearest thing to an underground as seen in other European countries. There are rumors that around 5,000 foreign workers are hiding in one forest district south of Frankfurt Am Main, and that they constantly raid village stores and rob farmers. Food rather than politics is apparently the main objective of these bands.

The communists, although well organized, are few in number. There are said to be not more than 200 in Berlin. They operate in twos and threes, never telephoning or writing and meeting only occasionally.

Unverified reports came across the border throughout December of disturbances in the Krupp works by what was called a communist anti-Nazi ring. A number of workers, including some engineers, were said to have been arrested.

In Italy German troops have made a stand along the southern bank of the river Reno east of the Valli de Comacchio lagoon, after withdrawing five German troops in the past two days. British troops in Greece, pursuing ELAS forces retreating from Athens, have occupied Thebes, forward base of the leftwing guerrilla units about 48 miles northwest of the capital, after entering through slight opposition.

ed, and our long supply lines are filled with moving supplies.

The president cautioned that there has been "over-optimistic speculation" about the possible end in war spending when Germany is crushed. We would make a great mistake, he declared, if we underestimated the task of whipping Japan.

Revenue Shrinking Foreseen

Mr. Roosevelt proposed no new tax legislation. But he estimated that under present tax laws, the federal revenue will shrink from \$45,700,000,000 to \$41,300,000,000 in the coming fiscal year.

This is because reduced war spending will mean smaller individual incomes and war profits—and therefore smaller tax payments.

Even with less revenue rolling in, the government will need to borrow 40 billion dollars compared with 51 billion in the present year.

The federal debt, when figured at the ultimate repayment value, is now 239 billion dollars. Mr. Roosevelt said it's expected to be 252 billion by July 1, and then rise to 292 billion during the fiscal year.

He added that this development will require a further boost in the debt limit which is now 260 billion.

Postwar "Musts" Listed

The president laid stress on what he called the three major "aftermath-of-war" items. They are all rising. Here they are:

1. Interest on the public debt. This will be \$4,500,000,000, an increase of \$750,000,000 over the present year.

2. Veterans' benefits — \$2,623,000,000, more than twice as much as in this year. That figure is going up and up. The president said the full impact of the veterans' program won't be felt until future years.

3. Tax refunds — \$2,725,000,000, an increase of \$556,000,000. About one billion dollars will go to individuals because the withholding tax will have taken more than the proper amount of their income taxes. (Other individuals will be paying the government for the opposite reason.)

The rest of the refunds will go to corporations. For example one billion dollars will be set aside because the law provides for 10 per cent refunds of excess profits taxes after the war.
