Oregon's Webfoot stirred the northern division, Pacific Coast conference basketball standings with egg-beater thoroughness last night and today the Huskies of Washington, without lifting a finger on their own behalf, were the league's meringue.

Scored rather than awed by the 46-36 defeat handed them

Monday night by the Cougars of Washington State, the Webfoot last night in Pullman grabbed the lead at the start and crushed every challenge to rack up a 47-37 victory, their third in the young season.

So today unbeaten Washington, the defending titlist, is on top with two wins, Oregon is second with three victories and a loss, W. S. C. third with one and one, and Idaho and Oregon State are comforting each other in the basement over a pair of defeats.

home at Melrose Monday after visiting at Sutherlin with her sister over the Christmas week.

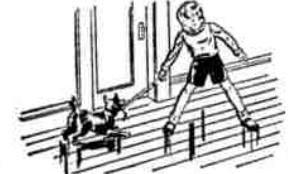
