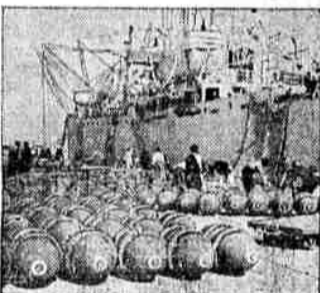

Wife Who Slew Husband With Axe Found Insane

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 11.—(AP)—A jury in superior court here yesterday found Mrs. Petra Lorentsen innocent by reason of insanity of charges of first degree murder in the axe slaying of her husband, Nick, on Christmas eve.

The jury deliberated but 10 minutes and found further that the insanity still exists and Mrs. Lorentsen is unsafe to be at large. Lorentsen brought his wife home from a sanitarium to spend Christmas with him and their twin children. The next day he was found dead in their home from multiple axe wounds. Mrs. Lorentsen signed a confession.

Assault to Kill Draws Long Term for Youth, 17

BAKER, Ore., Jan. 11.—(AP)—Timothy Berkeley, 17, of Utah who was arrested Jan. 4 after a running gun battle with state police and an automobile chase, today was sentenced by Circuit Judge Hubbard to not more than 20 years in the Oregon state penitentiary. Berkeley pleaded guilty to a charge of assault with intent to kill.

His companion, Clarence Harlan, of Visalia, Calif., was fatally wounded in the gun battle. Both Berkeley and Harlan were escaped prisoners from an Emmett, Idaho, jail.

Dealers Urged to Attend Price Talks Of OPA Agents

In a statement made today L. V. Hammock, chairman of the local War Price and rationing board, stressed the importance of merchants being able to establish all ceiling prices of every article for sale. He said, "The OPA so far as possible, endeavors to inform the public of such regulations as pertain to each individual business. The assistance of two price specialists from the district office in the hardware, furniture and automotive supplies fields is only another effort to bring to the merchants help in their price problems. Two meetings have been scheduled. One at Canyonville in the community hall Friday, Jan. 12, at 8 p. m., for the convenience of the merchants and citizens in the south end of Douglas county. Monday, Jan. 15, another meeting is to be held in the circuit room of the Douglas county court house at 8 p. m. for the convenience of merchants nearer to Roseburg.

Attendance Urged
"Dealers who must establish prices on anything from agricultural hand tools to zinc sulphate are urged to attend either of these meetings. If a merchant has an individual problem that he wishes to discuss with either J. K. Hubbard, price specialist, industrial materials and equipment section and Harry Huddleston, price specialist, consumer durable goods section, he should contact the local OPA office immediately for an appointment. In addition, general problems will be answered in the round table discussions at either of the meetings."
