SWEET POTATO PORK PIE... Mary Mills

This is a Sea Level Recipe tested for low altitude baking

- 2 cups cooked cubed pork
- 3 cups cooked cubed sweet potatoes
- 1 cup cooked peas
- 1/4 cup minced onion
- 1 medium-size green pepper, minced

- 3 cups combined meat and vegetable stock
- 1/2 cup Enriched Fisher's Blend Flour

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
