

Umpqua Port's Board Organized For 1945 Service

REEDSPORT — The Port of Umpqua Commission held its annual meeting Monday morning with President Norman Weatherly presiding and the following commissioners in attendance: Nonda Anderson, secretary; James Ford, treasurer; H. T. Lewis, commissioner; H. C. McCrea, assistant secretary, and Wallace G. Benson, attorney. Absent, Bart Roberts, vice president and retiring commissioner.

The newly elected commissioners, O. H. Hinsdale of Gardiner and Nonda Anderson, Reedport, and James Ford, Jr., Gardiner, the latter two being re-elected to succeed themselves, presented their credentials and were seated and the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Norman Weatherly of Reedport, president; O. H. Hinsdale, vice president; Nonda Anderson, secretary; James Ford, treasurer; H. C. McCrea of Reedport, assistant secretary, and Wallace G. Benson, of Reedport, attorney.

President Weatherly then appointed the following committees: Finance, Ford, Anderson and Hinsdale; dredging and engineering, Lewis, Ford and Anderson; harbors and wharves, Hinsdale, Anderson and Lewis.

Dock Service Approved
The matter of the reconstruction of the county dock in conjunction with the city of Reedport and the county was approved as to survey recently made with the county commissioners and city and port commissioners committees. A letter of thanks and appreciation for his work in connection with the commission was ordered drawn and addressed to Bart Roberts the retiring member of the commission.

The bond of the port treasurer was ordered raised from \$5,000 to \$10,000 and the secretary ordered to renew the bond. A new lease of a portion of the port dock to the Columbia River Packers association, extending their occupancy for another year, was approved and filed. A contract leasing the pilot boat "Tiger" to Chester Rowles for fishing purposes was ratified and filed.

Mr. Hinsdale was authorized to make a survey of the activities of the port business for the past year and the possibilities of its activities and source of business for the immediate future. The matter of improvement of the port's island properties was discussed and the probabilities of the establishment of an airport or a landing field thereon in the immediate future was approached. A lease on the island land to a valley dairyman for stock grazing purposes was renewed.

Fire Losses At Reedsport Light

REEDSPORT — According to the annual report of Chief Kelley of the Reedsport fire department, his men answered 21 alarms during the year and every one of them were actually fires with no false alarms received. The department equipment was in service 14½ hours during the year and 3,700 feet of hose was laid with the pumper in service 5½ hours and the booster pump 11 hours. Nearly all fire were in small buildings and 10 of the alarms were for grass or brush fires and one in a motor vehicle. Although \$89,550 of property was at risk under these fires only \$2,775 was recorded as a loss, with \$2,725 paid in insurance. Overheaters and defective flues and smokers' carelessness were responsible for 11 of the fires, 5 were attributed to rubbish and litter and the others to

faulty electric wiring, hot grease and metals including neglected electrical appliances, spilled oil and roof sparks.

REEDSPORT — The new mayor of Reedsport, John Skalauren, formerly a city councilman, together with two newly elected councilmen, were seated at the postponed first meeting of the year at the council chamber at the city hall Monday night. The new councilmen seated were Andy Knutsen and Lloyd Richardson.

son. Immediately after taking their seats the mayor appointed the following committee: finance, John Unger and S. S. Smiley, building and property, S. S. Smiley and John Unger; water, M. J. Thompson and A. Knutsen; lights, Knutsen and Thompson; streets and parks, Lester Johnson and Lloyd Richardson; police and fire, Richardson and Johnson; city recorder and treasurer, H. C. McCrea; city attorney, Wallace G. Benson; city marshal, H. M. McCabe; night marshal, John Cunningham; water commissioner, C. C. Clark; fire chief, M. M. Kelly; city engineer, H. T. Lewis. By unanimous vote John Unger was selected as the president of the council.

A letter and resolution from the office of the state treasurer relative to the city's allotment of postwar money was read and the resolution adopted and the whole referred to the street committee for further action.

The council accepted an invitation from the Reedsport Chamber of Commerce to appoint a committee to sit in with other civic bodies at a meeting of the youths organization, to assist in formulating plans for the advancement of the youth movement in this city. Councilman Knutsen was appointed to this committee.

Miscellaneous Matters.
A communication from Robin Reed stating that he had procured a state motel license for the operation of what was formerly known as Reed's Cabins and asking that his water rent be reduced in conformity with other state licensed motel and auto camps in the city, was referred to the water committee.

The street committee chairman announced that the city had arranged to purchase a large amount of fine gravel from the Umpqua River Navigation Co., and that as soon as permissible would commence the spreading of gravel on all the dedicated streets in the city looking in advance to the permanent improvement of the same. Several complaints of obstructions in streets and alleys were referred to the proper committees for action.

M. M. Kelly, chief of the fire department, submitted his report on the activities of the department which showed that although he was in command of that city activity and was on a small salary that the members of the department received more in money for their attendance at drills and fires during the year than he.

Upon motion this was immediately remedied and hereafter the chief will receive in addition to his monthly salary compensation in addition equal to that of members of the department.

The recorder announced that the auditors had almost completed their work of auditing the city books for over a period of three years and that their report would be presented at a special council meeting to be held next week.

What to do about beans, macaroni, rice, etc.

Versatile—is the word for these foods—because they can be made the basis for a large variety of low cost main dishes. To make real meals from them—just look at these ideas:

Try serving steamed or boiled rice, spaghetti or noodles in place of potatoes.

Serve macaroni or spaghetti topped with home-made or canned chili for a hearty economy dish.

Make a rice custard from left-over rice—or add it to ground meat dishes, griddle cakes or muffins.

LOAF	
4 cups cooked spaghetti, macaroni, noodles or rice	½ tsp. paprika
2 tbsps. shortening	1 cup grated American cheese
3 tbsps. flour	3 tbsps. finely chopped pimiento
1½ cups milk	¾ cup finely chopped green pepper
1 tsp. salt	3 eggs
½ tsp. pepper	

Make white sauce: melt shortening, blend in flour, add milk gradually and cook until thick, about 10 minutes, stirring constantly. Add seasonings, cheese, pimiento and green pepper; cook 5 minutes; add spaghetti, macaroni, noodles or rice. Add well beaten eggs and pour into well-greased loaf pan or ring mold. Bake in pan of hot water in moderate oven (350° F.) 45 minutes or until set; unmold. Serves 6.

BEAN CHILI	
3 medium-size onions	1 tbsps. salt
1 bud garlic	3 cups cooked tomatoes
1½ lbs. ground beef	3 cups water
3 tbsps. oil or shortening	2 cups dried pink beans
2 to 3 tbsps. chili powder	3 bay leaves

a. Chop onions and garlic. Saute slowly with meat in hot oil or shortening in large heavy frying pan until meat separates, stirring constantly.

b. Add seasonings, tomatoes strained through sieve, and water. Cook slowly 2 hours, stirring occasionally.

c. Pick over and wash beans. Cook slowly in covered 3 to 4 qt. kettle with water to cover until tender, 2 to 3 hours. Add more water as needed to keep beans covered with liquid.

d. Add meat mixture to beans; let stand several hours or overnight. Heat when ready to serve. Serves 8 to 10 generously.

(Note: If beef is not available, other ground meats such as lamb, pork, liver, heart, or combination of these may be used.)
