

Church Cooperates In Hobby Program For Teen Aged

Through the cooperation of the Presbyterian church, the recreation committee announces a number of hobby groups which will meet once a week for junior and senior high school students. These groups are small and designed to meet the interest of students who are interested in a specific hobby.

The first group to meet will be a woodcarving class for girls under the direction of L. K. Cornwell. Mr. Cornwell states that the group will start by carving lapel pins out of various types of wood. The only equipment necessary for the girls meeting with this group is a pocket knife and a pencil. The meeting will be in the church basement, with entrance on Jackson street, from 7 to 9 each Friday evening. Girls who are interested in woodcarving are urged to attend the first meeting.

A group for the same age boys who are interested in chemistry will be held each Tuesday at 4:15 under supervision of LeRoy Hiett at the same place. Boys who have some equipment are requested to bring it, however, it is not necessary to have equipment, as it will be furnished.

Rev. Mr. Roach has issued an invitation to any teen aged to attend the hobby groups, as they are not limited to members of the church, being a community project.

Jap-American Finds Treatment In Vale Area Nice

HILLSBORO, Ore., Jan. 11.—(AP)—A Japanese-American who moved inland three years ago to avoid confinement in a relocation center was back here today to get his rifles, field glasses and cameras, but not to stay.

Hiroshi Sunamoto, one-time Cornelius berry farmer, presented a federal request for return of his property to Sheriff J. W. Connell. He said he wants the guns to shoot annoying jackrabbits on his farm at Vale, Ore.

He shrugged off mention of the Hood River incident in which names of Japanese-American soldiers were removed from an American Legion honor roll, saying, "I don't care to talk about those things."

His wife, whom he terms "a good American too," and their small child went to Vale after Pearl Harbor and took over a 60-acre sugar beet ranch.

"People treated me nice," he said. "The going was tough but I made a living raising sugar beets and onions. There was no trouble. I still have a year to go on my lease, so I won't be back here for awhile."

"I like it better here where it is nice and green and I would like to come back, but have not made up my mind. Other Japanese who own property here will be back, I think."
