War Output Pace to Be Speeded, Krug Announces

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12—(AP) Fifty per cent of all war production programs will rise at "a tremendous rate" under a new speed-up which includes a three-fold increase in critical aircraft in six months, J. A. Krug revealed today.

Partly to equip new French army divisions for the fight against Germany, about \$2,500,000,000 worth of new arms output is being added to the 1945 schedule, the WPB chairman said.

The expansion brings 1945 total output to some \$64,500,000,000, slightly higher than 1944, Krug said.

Krug said restrictions on outdoor advertising and ornamental and display lighting would not be imposed mandatory before February 1.

Strike Still Grips British Columbia

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 12—(CP)—Thirteen thousand Vancouver students were enjoying an enforced holiday on the fourth day of a strike of street railwaymen and bus drivers here, in Victoria and in nearby New Westminster and there was still no sign of an end to the transportation hiccup.

Almost half of the 60 public schools in the city were closed and little more than half of the 3,000 students at the University of British Columbia were able to report for lectures.

The News-Herald said that "a move from an expected quarter" was imminent and might end the strike before Monday.

Meanwhile 63 drivers of Vancouver Island Coach Lines company in Victoria went back to work today after the company agreed to a joint submission with their union to the regional war labor board urging that the drivers be granted the same wages as British Columbia Electric company drivers receive at the end of their strike in three coast cities.

Emergency gasoline rations have been given since the strike began to motorists carrying workers to essential industries. In addition good weather has enabled many to walk to work.

In Vancouver shipyards and aircraft plants reported 80 to 90 per cent of total staffs have been turning up for work either walking to their jobs or being driven under special pickup arrangements made by each plant.
