Marry at Presbyterian Church

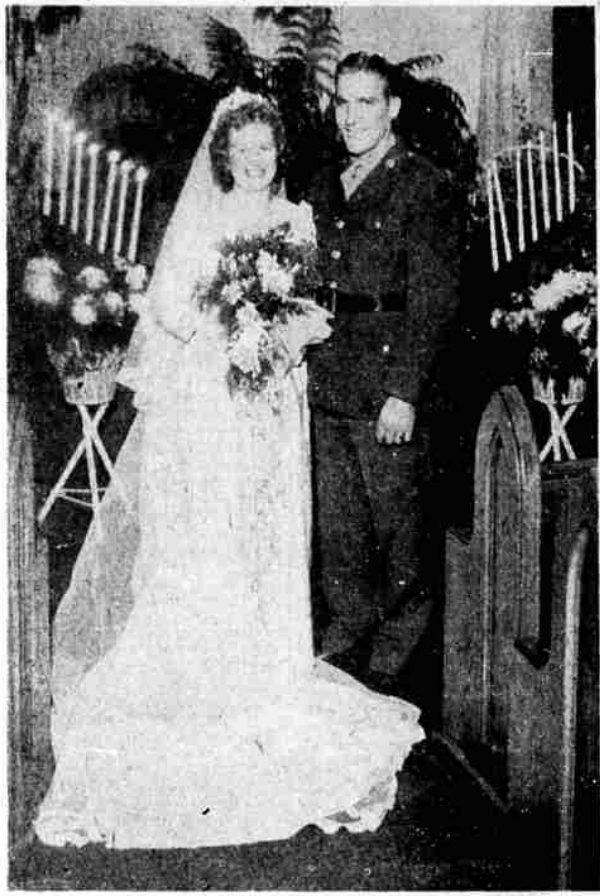

MILDRED DILLING TO BE HEARD IN HARP CONCERT ON FEB. 1

Miss Mildred Dilling, harpist, will be heard by the Roseburg Community Concert association at 8:15 o'clock the evening of Feb. 1, at the Junior high school.

Mildred Dilling has achieved world recognition as one of the outstanding harpists of the time. Born in America, her early musical studies were made in this country; later she continued them in Europe under Henriette Renle, the great French harpist.

Her European debut took place at the Salle Erard, Paris. Such was the success of this initial appearance that she was imaged for gala concerts at the Trocadero and the Salle Gaveau, the largest concert halls in Paris, followed by concerts on the Continent and in the British Isles.

Returning to America, her concerts here duplicated her continental triumphs and started her upward on the road to assured success, the heights of which she has reached and maintained. Her frequent New York recitals are brilliant events in the music calendar of the metropolis.

Ahead her fame has kept pace with her renown here. Frequent performances in the British Isles, France and elsewhere on the continent have gained for her art the appreciation of thousands.

To this American artist was given the distinction of being the first solo harpist to broadcast in Ireland, land of the harp, and to give the first harp recital for television for the British Broadcasting company.

Miss Dilling has had the honor of playing seven private engagements at the White House.

She recently made her motion picture debut, presented by Artists Films.

Mildred Dilling's unrivaled position as the foremost woman harpist has been acknowledged by the critics and by a vast public in Europe and America. Never before has a harpist achieved so wide-spread a following.

Her rare gift of interpretation, coupled with a complete mastery of technique, has aroused new interest in the harp as a solo instrument and increased the demand for her as a recitalist.
