Early Care Cuts High Mortality Of Dairy Calves

A little extra care of calves soon after birth will help reduce the nation's high mortality of dairy calves, says Harold Ewalt, assistant extension specialist in dairy husbandry at O. S. C. Ewalt reports that the American Veterinary Medical association has issued a series of "caution" suggestions which are both applicable and timely here in Oregon. These suggestions, with some modifications by Ewalt, follow:

"Keep the expecting mother near the barn, where she can be watched. Do not allow her to seek a far corner of the pasture, where she cannot be observed, and help if necessary.

"Give the cow rations rich in bran, molasses, and oil feeds to help condition her; also provide plenty of clean, fresh water.

"Provide a dry, clean, well bedded maternity stall. Cows are highly susceptible to infection at this time, so sanitation is important.

"Be sure the calf receives several good feedings of the cow's first milk. This is rich in vitamin A and other elements which the young animal must have.

"Prevent calf pneumonia and scours by keeping newborn calves in clean, well ventilated pens. Do not shut calves in poorly lighted, unventilated quarters, or in cold, draughty quarters where pneumonia may be contracted.

"If the calf shows symptoms of illness, have a veterinarian examine it promptly. Some of the newer sulfa drugs have proven highly effective in reducing pneumonia losses among young animals.

Authorities have estimated that more than one-fifth of all calves die before they reach milking age.

Small Business Inquiry Will Be Held in Northwest

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16—(AP)—Representative Jackson (D., Wash.) says he has been assured that the house small business committee will hold hearings in the Pacific northwest early this year.

Jackson, only far-west member of this committee, is anxious that the committee look into reconstruction problems on the coast.

"The war," he told a reporter, "had made possible, for the first time, a real period of industrialization in the northwest, with new developments in heavy industry and the establishment of an entirely new field of production in light metals.

"We shall want to know how the recent executive order limiting contracts which can be given to small industries is likely to effect the conversion of war industry to peace-time procedure and whether these small businesses are able to survive under the manpower restrictions."

Sgt. Leo D. Boyle Wounded Second Time in Action

Staff Sergeant Leo D. Boyle, Roseburg, son of Mrs. Charles M. Spain, former Roseburg resident, now residing at Compton, Calif., recently was wounded in action while fighting near Nijmegen, Holland, but is recovering in a hospital in England, according to word received by his mother. He has been awarded the Purple Heart with Oak Leaf Cluster, as he had previously been wounded, shortly after D-day while fighting in France.

Sergeant Boyle wrote to his mother that he was struck by shrapnel while regrouping with his platoon after parachuting into Holland. "We were behind a dyke when I heard the shells," he said. "Then I saw a cloud of dust, and I was hit."

The paratrooper's wife, Mrs. Wyn Boyle, an English girl, lives in Aldbourne, Wiltshire, England. A brother, Staff Sergeant Stanley Boyle, is with the air forces in England, where he is an instructor in gunnery.

Sergeant Leo Boyle served in the army from 1932 to 1935 and re-enlisted in August 1942. He trained at Fort Benning, Ga., and while there was one of 600 paratroopers who made a forced march of 115 miles across country in three days carrying full packs. In accomplishing this feat, Boyle and other members of the group surpassed by 15 miles a record claimed by members of the Japanese army.

He is a son of the late Clifford Boyle, who for many years was employed in the Roseburg post office as a clerk.

All groups meet in the Junior High school gymnasium. Persons desiring to join may contact Mrs. Peterson or may report at any of the class sessions.

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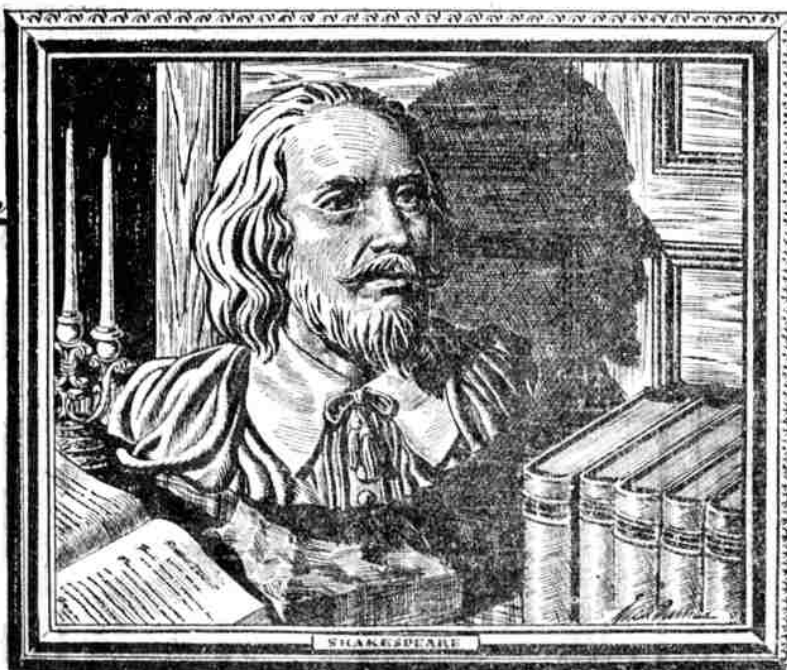
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
