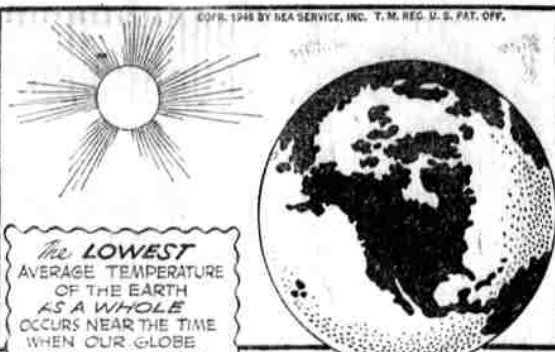

Some Light Trucks to Be Available to Farmers Although about 60 per cent of the scheduled output of 35,704 light trucks is earmarked for agricultural applicants, farmers should not overestimate the effect of the potential supply on the tight transportation problems facing them in 1945. County AAA committees will receive farmer applications for purchase priorities which will be submitted to the Office of Defense Transportation for final approval. The light truck production program is the first one approved since 1942 and is only a small percentage of national needs, so the balance of worthy applicants for these trucks is certain to be far in excess of the number available.

Dairy Income to Remain High During Present Year

With cash receipts from dairy products in 1945 expected to remain high, USDA estimates cash receipts from dairy products in 1944 at a record of \$2,950-million, excluding government payments, or about double the 1935-39 average. The largest portion of this increase has come from milk sold at wholesale, which in 1944 accounted for two-thirds of the cash receipts from dairy products compared with about one-half in the pre-war 1935-39 period.

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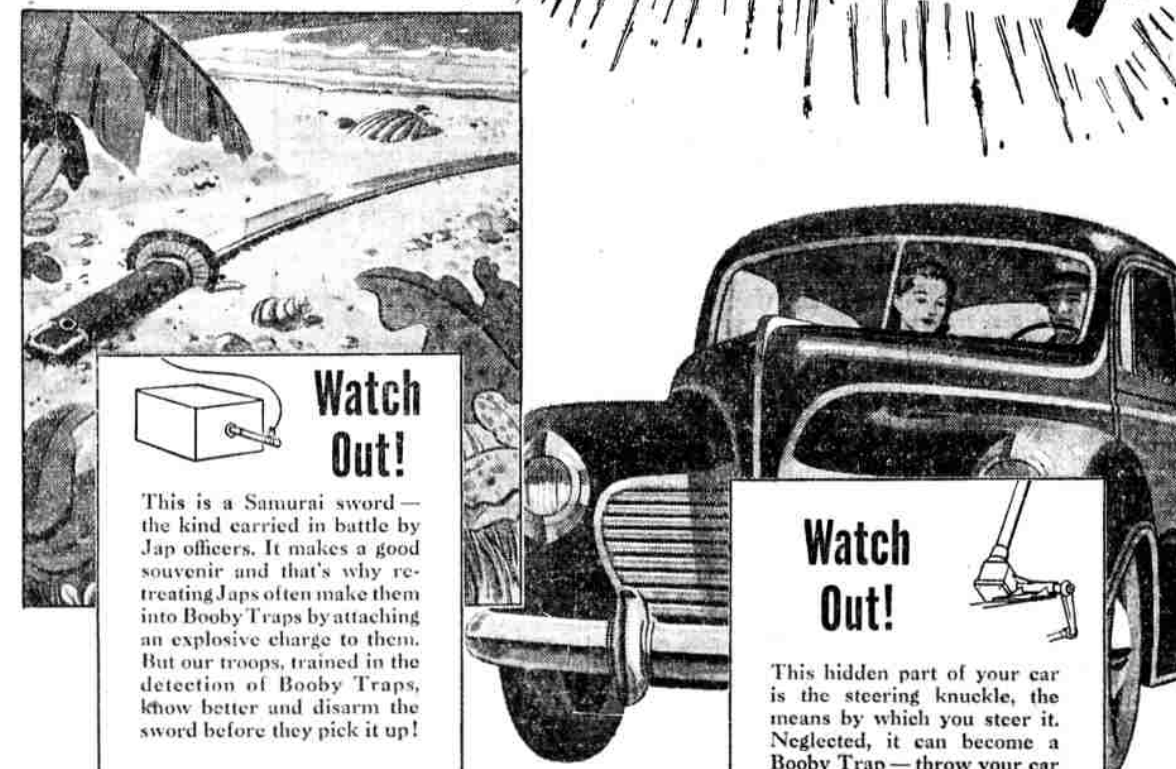
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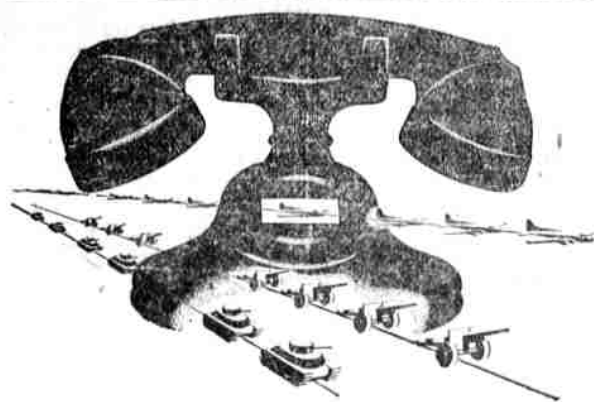
