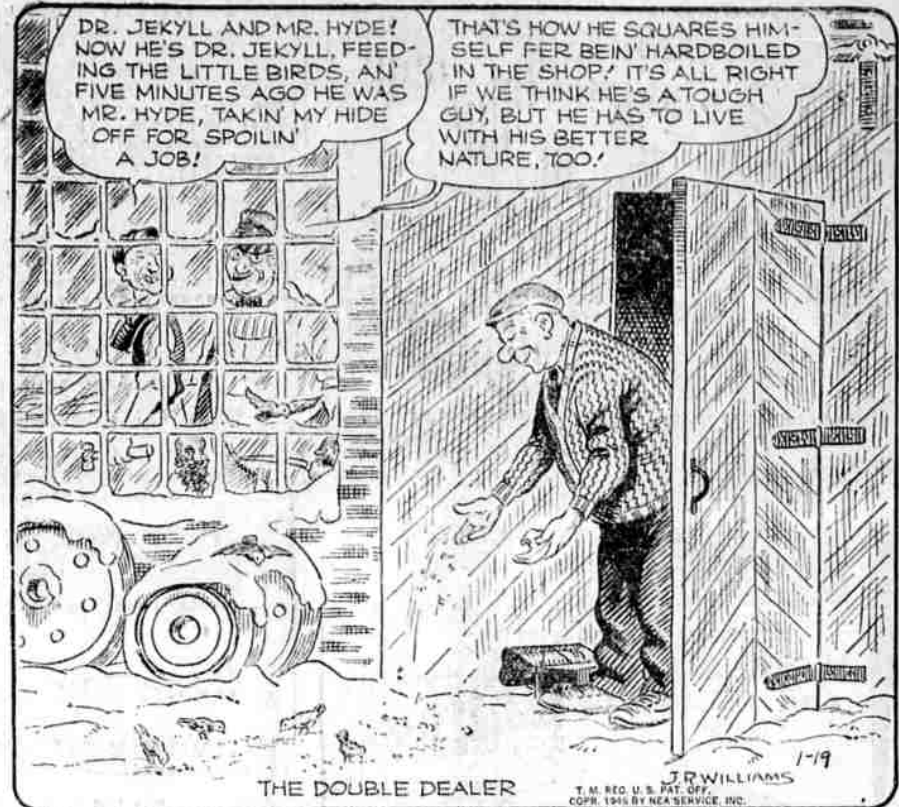

Washington News From an Inside View

Argument, Sentiment, Comment

The principal national problem now is manpower. Fighting manpower is needed on both sides of the world as the intensity of the war increases. War production manpower is needed to provide more shells, more bombs, more small arms ammunition, and to speed up our own robot bomb program.

The recommendations contained in the Byrnes report, coupled with the emphasis given this subject in the president's message to congress on Jan. 6, will undoubtedly lead to specific action. Military age men classified as 4-F will be inducted into the army in accordance with very drastically lowered physical standards for limited service. Under orders already issued, job-holders, most classified in 2-A and 2-B are to be reclassified and inducted. A bill has been introduced to induct 20,000 or more army nurses under selective service.

Some of these things can be accomplished under existing law. Some new legislation will be necessary. It is safe to say that action on necessary legislation will be prompt.

Actually most of the things sought to be accomplished by a national service law will be in effect as soon as the above mentioned steps have been taken. It is quite likely though that an all-embracing service act will be taken up by congress early in this session.

Assignment Acclaimed
The transfer of Dr. A. J. (Al) Hall, outstanding scientist of the Forest service here, to Portland to become director of the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment station is important news to everyone concerned with the lumber and logging industry. Dr. Hall has won international fame for his work on the development and improvement of processes for making alcohol from wood waste. His work was of great value in the successful effort to secure approval for the construction of the large alcohol-from-sawdust plant now being built at Springfield, Oregon. As director of the Experiment station, Dr. Hall's work will contribute enormously toward the solution of wood utilization and forestry problems in our area.

Stephen Weycock, who has done an outstanding job as director of the Northwest station, has been transferred to the station at Berkeley, Calif., as its director. **What of Camp White?** The War department cannot make up its mind what to do with Camp White. It does not know whether to use it for troop concentrations, prior to the stepping up of the offensive against the Japanese; whether to use it for prisoners of war; or whether it will be needed for new inductees under the stepped up selective service program.

Meanwhile, the navy department is very anxious, and I mean VERY anxious, to obtain the hospital at Camp White for use as a navy hospital, but the army will not release it.

This splendid 1500-bed hospital facility, complete with the finest modern equipment, is idle and has been idle for many months.

insufficient applications. Douglas county mills have been unable to furnish supplies to retail yards as nearly all are engaged in furnishing crating material on government order.

Mr. Maxwell stated his intention of resubmitting his findings to the War Production board with the hope of opening new sources "to retail yards, thus permitting them to increase inventories sufficient to meet imperative building requirements.

Preference in issuance of priorities, it was stated, will be given persons employed in essential industry, or to owners who will sell, rent or lease newly constructed homes to essential workers.

Joe Louis Plans to Quit After 2nd Bout With Conn

LONDON, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis will defend his title once again in a return bout with Billy Conn, and then will retire, the army newspaper Stars and Stripes will say tomorrow. Tony Cordaro, staff writer for the army paper, says in the story to be published tomorrow that Louis is confided to him last summer during a tour of the European theater that he planned to fight twice before retiring, but that this was with the expectation he would meet Conn this summer.

"Since it is now generally agreed that the earliest the two can possibly meet again is in 1946," Cordaro writes, "the bomber will bow to Father Time and hang 'em up after the return bout with Billy the Kid."
